Some improvements are being made to the Methodist church building so that there will be a better means of exit in case of fire. A. N. Striker is doing the work.

The new barnyard frame business building at the corner of West Eighth and Charnell streets is about completed. About all to be done now is to put in the glass front.

Howe & Broy today sold the Mrs. Valentine tract of 15 acres west of the city to J. Beebe for \$1500, and the Geo. Yarrington lot on West Tenth street to Robert Rae for \$600.

The west foundation of the new Hullin block which began to settle is now being repaired under the direction of Architect Hunnicker and it will soon be in good condition again.

JOHN M' COURT SELECTED TO SUCCEED BRISTOL

Washington, March 5.—John McCourt, of Pendleton, who was a student at Willamette University under Representative Hawley, who practiced law before Representative Ellis as judge, who is a warm personal friend of Senator Fulton, but who is absolutely unknown to Senator Bourne, was today unanimously recommended by the Oregon delegation for United States district attorney. His nomination is expected next Monday, and if it materializes he will be promptly confirmed.

This morning Mr. Fulton endeavored to get the delegation together to call on the president and discuss the district attorneyship. Mr. Bourne declined to go and Mr. Hawley was unable to go, as he was obliged to appear before the sub-committee having in charge Mr. Fulton's Oregon and California land grant resolution, so Mr. Fulton and Mr. Ellis went alone.
