There are birdhouses built by the boys, bread baked by the girls, needlework, drawing and other work executed by the pupils of the grammar schools. There are a total of 443 bird houses, 215 of which came from the Patterson school, 159 from the Geary and 70 from the Central. Some are of excellent workmanship and show that their builders will some day make their mark in the world as architects or building contractors.
