University of Oregon News

The Varsity basketball team finished its season last Friday night when the fast Muscatine, Iowa, team defeated the Collegians 30 to 29. The Muscatine team beat Dallas in her first game by a larger score than the Oregon aggregation was defeated by. The Eastern five also defeated O. A. C. by a good margin.

This game finished the best season that Oregon ever passed through. The schedule this season showing seventeen games played. Only five of these were played on the home floor, and partly to that is due the fact that the 'Varsity bunch only won eight out of seventeen games. The total points scored by the varsity men was 363, against their opponents' 339.

Four trips were taken during the season, the first to Dallas and Monmouth, the second to Southern Oregon for three games and the third through the Inland Empire for six contests, and the fourth a little jaunt to Corvallis.

The men who played during the season were: forwards, Moore, Ramp, Vansey and Watson; Centers, Looney and Stevenson; Guards, Captain Hathaway, Farrington and Chairman, Utility, Strang, Moore, Ramp, Stevenson and Captain Hathaway graduate in June, giving a fine chance for new men next year, yet leaving a good nucleus to work with. The season this year extended from December 1 to March 1. Manager Nelson and Coach Murphy had charge of the squad.

The Junior-Freshman basketball team beat their rivals, the Senior Freshman five Friday evening in a good preliminary contest to the Muscatine game. Among old basketball stars seen in Eugene before were, Penland, Kuykendall and Bond. Some of the Freshmen played very promising games. Lewis, a Junior, was formerly a guard on Monmouth team that won the championship of the state.

Chances in Civil Service.
On March 11 and 12, chances will be given in Portland, Baker City, Astoria and Eugene, for examinations of male teachers for the Philippines. Two examinations will be offered, one for assistants and one for teachers proper. The usual subjects will be tested. The salaries are \$1000 to \$1500. Opportunities for promotion will be given for positions paying \$2000 to \$3000.

On March 25, 1908, an examination will be given on application at Astoria, Baker City, Eugene, and Portland for superintendents of construction and plumbing. The subjects will be those concerning architecture and plumbing. Experience will also be required. The salary is \$6.00 per day, the term of employment six months.

Heavy Rainfall in 1907.
During the year 1907, 46.27 inches of rain fell at the University weather bureau station, a surplus over normal of 7.44 inches. The normal rain fall was 38.83 inches. The last two months, however, have been dry. In January 2.82 inches falling when the average is 5.06 and in February, 2.67 inches, the normal being 4.76 inches. The year 1906 was below the average, a little less than an inch. The total precipitation was 37.55, the normal 38.23.

At Roseburg the average rainfall amounts to about 33 inches, and further north considerable more. Tillamook is said to have the heaviest rainfall of any place in the state.

Delegates to Mennepeith.
The different classes of the University held meetings last week and elected the following delegates to the state oratorical convention which will be held at Monmouth in the afternoon previous to the oratorical contest March 13. From the Seniors, Benjamin Huntington and Mozelle Hall; Juniors, T. E. Townsend and Jesse H. Bond; Sophomores, Horton C. Nicholas and Clarence Steel; Freshman, Arthur Goary and Hazel McNair. Thos. R. Townsend is the chairman of the delegation and Ben Huntington toaster. Burt Prescott '08, will represent Oregon in the contest.

\$2000 in Prizes.
The American Sunday School Union offers \$2000 in cash prizes for three books. The first prize of \$1000 will be given for the best original work on the subject, "Christian Principles in our Rural Communities. How to Make for a Better Controlling Influence." The next prize of \$500 and the third prize of \$400 are offered for first and second places on the best original books on the subject, "The Bible An Attractive Book." The volumes are expected to be between 40,000 and 70,000 words in length. Freedom in form and treatment is permitted.

The object of the work is to create sentiment along the lines of the themes, and the prizes are offered under the John C. Green fund. The books must be in the hands of the judges on April 1, 1909. They should be addressed to The American Sunday School Union, 1346 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pa.
