

NIGHT RIDERS RAID, TERRORIZE AND KILL

Brooksville, Ky., March 10.—Fifty night riders early today burned 150 pounds of tobacco belonging to Robert Stenton, one of the wealthiest planters in this section. The men were heavily armed and placed a guard over the telephone exchange so that no request for assistance could be made, but attempted no violence. They did not burn the warehouse in which the tobacco was stored.

LEADER OF GANG KILLED IN FIGHT

Clarksville, Tenn., March 10.—Near Woodford, ten miles from here, Brown Bennett, son of an association tobacco raiser, was found dead early this morning with a bullet hole in his head. Near Bennett were two dead horses and three empty shot guns. It is believed that Bennett was attacked by night riders. Later, it is believed that Bennett was a night rider and was shot down by parties whom he and his gang attacked, and that his comrades, in their haste, had to leave him dying on the scene of the flight.

BOOSTERS OF ROSEBURG STAND BY UNIVERSITY

WARREN M'KAY MURDERS FAMILY AND SUICIDES

Tacoma, March 10.—A special dispatch to the News from Tenino says that Warren McKay, a native of Canada, killed his wife and three children at his home there and committed suicide last night. Two men at work early today found McKay's body, clad in underclothing, on the trail leading to town from home. It is believed he poisoned himself, as no marks were found on his body. The men notified the town marshal and he went to McKay's home, where he found the bodies of the other members of the family, the wife and two older children with their throats cut, and the other with its head crushed in with blows of a hammer. McKay had been a sufferer from cancer of the face and this fact preyed upon his mind.

ANARCHIST DEMANDS MONEY FROM BANK THREATENING DEATH

Omaha, March 10.—At 10 o'clock this morning an unknown anarchist entered the Merchants' National Bank of this city and demanded a large sum of money, at the same time displaying a bottle believed to contain nitroglycerine, with which he threatened to blow up the bank if his request was not complied with. The man talked in a rambling manner about having had \$5000 in the National Bank of Commerce of Kansas City when it failed. "And since you fellows are all in together," he said, "you had just better hand me over my money or I'll blow you and this bank and all of us to hell." While talking he produced a three-ounce bottle containing a thick yellow liquid. The vice president said he would go and get the money, but the fellow commanded him not to move or he would drop the bottle. Drake sat down and told the stranger he would talk it over with him. To this the man agreed, all the time keeping the bottle in his hand. The fellow said he had been 48 hours without food so Drake suggested that they get something to eat, and the man said: "All right, but don't try any monkey business or you're a dead man." President Hamilton, of the bank, overheard enough of the conversation to enable him to grasp the situation, and he telephoned the police, and with two officers in plain clothes followed Drake and the anarchist to a nearby restaurant. Detectives slipped up behind the man as he sat there and pinioned his arms, relieving him of the bottle before he knew what was up. "The bottle was sent to a chemist for analysis."

PAVING WORK TO BE RESUMED IMMEDIATELY

SUPERINTENDENT SHUEY HERE TO PLACE PLANT IN READINESS FOR OPERATION. IF PRESENT GOOD WEATHER LASTS WARREN COMPANY WILL BEGIN LAYING BITUMINOUS ON EUGENE STREETS INSIDE OF A WEEK OR TEN DAYS. W. L. Archambeau, manager of the Warren Construction Company's paving plants, arrived in Eugene last night from Portland. This morning he stated to a Guard reporter that if the present good weather lasts the company will be laying the "hot stuff" on Eugene's streets again in a week or ten days. Even if the rain does come again right away the rock crusher at the quarry on the west slope of Skinner's Butte will be started up as soon as it can be placed in readiness. John H. Shuey, superintendent of the plant, also arrived up from Portland last night and today began the work of getting the crusher and mixing plant in shape for operation. It is expected that the crusher will be ready to start up some time this week. A large force of men will be employed when the mixer starts up again and the work mapped out for Eugene this summer will be rushed. There is a great deal of it to do and it will probably crowd the company to finish it all by the time the rains set in next fall. Mr. Archambeau stated that work on the cement curbsing where they had not been put in on the streets to be paved will be begun at once. He said he did not know which street would be paved first, that being left to the superintendent. Some of the streets will have to be excavated while others will have to be filled in, and those streets that will be the most convenient to handle first will be the ones on which the work will be started right away. The Warren company has ten blocks of pavement already contracted for and in addition to this the city has ordered eleven blocks on East Eleventh street paved and the contract will doubtless be let within a short time, thus making 21 blocks to be paved this year. Property owners on other streets are talking of paving, and it is probable that before the season is over several more blocks will have been contracted for. Perhaps a hundred men will be employed by the Warren Company here during the spring and summer.

PROSECUTOR HENEY FILES SWORN REPLY

San Francisco, March 10.—A voluminous affidavit, comprising 65,000 words, was filed in the superior court this morning by Special Prosecutor Henevy. This is his answer to the affidavits previously presented by the attorneys for the defense in an effort to have Ruef's indictment annulled on the ground that Ruef was promised immunity by the prosecution. Henevy denies that Ruef was promised complete immunity by the prosecution, but was given to understand that he must accept sentence for extortion; that no request for leniency could be granted in extortion cases unless Ruef furnished corroborative evidence. That Rabbi Nieto declared he believed Ruef should receive some punishment; that Henevy refused absolutely to consider the draft of the immunity contract drawn by Ruef; that Attorney Henry Ach freely admitted that Ruef had no chance to escape conviction on some of the bribery charges, and urged his client to accept the best terms he could get from the prosecution; that Ach declared to Henevy that Ruef would implicate some big people, specifically mentioning Calhoun, Ford and Herlin; that the midnight meeting with Judges Lawlor and Dunne was suggested by Rabbi Nieto, and that no promise of immunity was secured from either judge; that the habeas corpus proceedings to determine the legality of the citizenship were dismissed because Ruef feared he would be killed by the "higher ups" if placed in the sheriff's custody; that Ruef informed the newspapermen the day he confessed that he expected to serve a term in prison, and that Henevy refused to have anything further to do with Ruef when convinced that the latter was lying. District Attorney Langdon also filed an affidavit admitting the writing of the agreement, but asserts that Ruef broke the contract.

SCHMITZ GIVEN FREEDOM BY SUPREME COURT

San Francisco, March 10.—Owing to the absence of Judge Dunne, nothing was accomplished in securing the liberty of former Mayor Schmitz except the consent of Judge Dooling to allow the filing of the remittitur from the supreme court. Schmitz' counsel state that if Judge Dunne is not present tomorrow they will go before the supreme court and ask for a writ compelling the immediate release of Schmitz from jail.

HARRY ORCHARD PLEADS GUILTY TO MURDER CHARGE

Caldwell, Idaho, March 10.—Harry Orchard this morning, before Judge Wood, withdrew his former plea of not guilty, entered by order of the court when he stood mute at his arraignment, and entered a plea of guilty to the murder of former Governor Steunenberg. Judge Wood will sentence him on March 18.

FOUR INDICTMENTS FOR LIQUOR SELLING

The grand jury this afternoon returned four indictments for liquor selling. One was against Allen Dow, who is already serving a thirty-day sentence for the same offense, and another against Andy Taylor, of this city. He appeared and gave bail and will enter his plea later. The other two persons indicted have not yet been arrested and their names are withheld until they are in custody.

BURGLARY AT JUNCTION CITY LAST NIGHT

Washburn's residence through a window at the rear of the house and carried off two suits of clothes and all of the silverware. There is no clue to the perpetrators, but it is thought to be the work of some one who is acquainted with the house.

RAYMOND HITCHCOCK PLACED ON TRIAL

New York, March 10.—The trial of Raymond Hitchcock, the actor, began this morning. He is being tried on an indictment growing out of charges preferred by a fifteen-year-old girl, who alleged that she was maltreated by Hitchcock.

SPANISH KING WELCOMED BY BARCELONIANS

Barcelona, March 10.—King Alfonso arrived here today and no disturbance of any kind marked the event. He was warmly received and applauded by the people, and will hold a reception at 4 o'clock today at the home of General Linera, at which the officers of the Austrian squadron will be present. The town is gaily decorated in his honor and the police had great difficulty in compelling obedience to the order prohibiting the customary showering of the king with flowers by enthusiasts.
