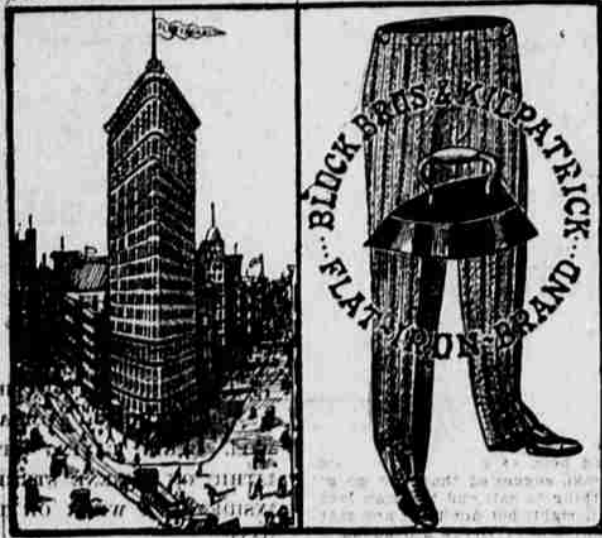

URGE CITIES TO OWN THEIR WATER SYSTEMS

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH CAN SEE NO OTHER SOURCE OF PURE SUPPLY—MATTERS OF GENERAL INTEREST DISCUSSED IN ANNUAL REPORT

Important suggestions and recommendations are carried in the annual report of the state board of health which has just been prepared and distributed. In the report the board gives the result of investigations which have been made during the past year on different subjects while at the same time directions and recommendations are given for the betterment of conditions generally in the health and sanitation of the state at large.

The water supply and sewage systems of the state are discussed and the board gives as its opinion that as the population grows it is becoming more and more imperative that the state secure control of these water systems. Municipal ownership of water systems is imperative for the securing of a good pure water in the growing towns.

Great stress is laid upon the sewage problem throughout the state. It is pointed out that the great increase in population during the past few years has overtaxed the sewer systems in operation and has made them inadequate to the work demanded of them.

On the other hand the great increase of sewage led through the systems and the fact that the present sewerage system is inadequate to handle the waste of the population of the state is pointed out. During the year the board has made a special investigation of conditions existing in the schools and the other first schools of the state. As a result of these investigations recommendations have been made for the better ventilation, plumbing and general sanitation.

Vital Statistics.

The collection of vital statistics, births, deaths and contagious diseases, has been a very satisfactory one considering the state as a whole, but has been very complete and accurate in those counties where the statisticians in many counties.

In those counties having an organized board of health and in which the physicians of the county take an active interest in complying with the board of health laws, the work has been carefully attended to and most useful and accurate material has been collected.

In 1907 a full representation of what has been done, the counties can be divided into three classes. In those counties where a complete record is kept, the statistics are complete with large numbers in which thorough investigation of the cause and failure of the compli- cation with the law, practically nothing has been done; third, counties of large area, sparsely settled and in which the collection of statistics is of necessity difficult.

Under the first class that of well organized boards of health, in which statistics approximately correct have been collected, are the following: Yamhill, Washington, Wasco, Tillamook, Multnomah, Marion, Linn, Lane, Benton, Clatsop, Coos, Jackson, Crook and Douglas. These counties with an estimated population of \$5,000, have reported 420 deaths, approximately 2,000 burials, and 1750 marriages and 2,000 baptisms.

The board believes that this class represents the annual birth and death rate of the state. Attention is called in the report to the prevalence of typhoid fever in Brigard, districts, and to the need of better sewage and drainage at the most resorts of Seaside and Newport.

The State University and Agricultural college are found to be in excellent condition in every respect. Each is supplied with pure water, adequate sewage and the buildings are suited in all respects to the needs of the students so far as sanitation is concerned.

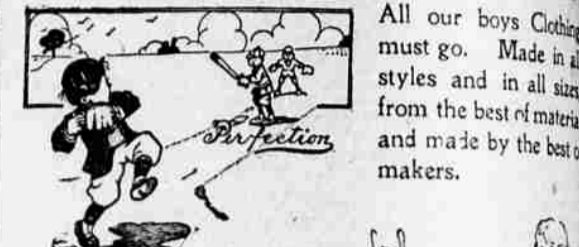
