The annual meeting of the Eugene Commercial Club was held last night when the time officers were elected for the ensuing year and much business was transacted. The officers elected were as follows:

President, C. S. Williams; vice president, S. S. Spencer; secretary, R. A. Knox; treasurer, Darwin Bristow; trustees, F. R. Wetherbee and F. L. Chambers.

The secretary's report was read as follows:

To the officers and members of the Eugene Commercial Club:

Gentlemen:—I beg to submit my report as secretary of the Eugene Commercial Club for the year ending March 8, 1908, as follows:

Amount of membership dues collected from March 13, 1907, to March 8, 1908, inclusive, \$1705.75; amount from application fees, \$755; amount from house receipts from March 13, 1907, to March 8, 1908, inclusive, \$1465.94; amount received for advertisement per Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, \$15; amount received for advertising per Willamette Valley Company, \$20; amount in treasury March 13, 1907, \$180.89. Total, \$4193.62.

Amount of warrants drawn on treasury, \$3513.58; amount of petty expenses, \$210.40; amount in treasury March 9, 1908, \$337.95; cash on

hand March 9, 1908, \$31.69. Total, \$4193.62.

Amount of interest-bearing debt

20; paid on principal of debt February 14, 1908, \$350.50; paid interest on principal, February 14, 1908, \$4.75. Total paid on principal, \$550; interest paid, \$38.25.

Treasurer's Report.

The report of the retiring secretary showed receipts to be \$4851.63, and disbursements \$3513.58; balance on hand, \$337.95.

Included in the various matters discussed and acted upon were the following:

A letter from William McMurray, general passenger agent of the S. P. Company, was read. Mr. McMurray stated that the company would run an excursion from Portland to Eugene on commencement day at the University in June, and it was expected that 300 persons would come up from the metropolis on that day. The new passenger depot, which would also be opened to the public on that date.

L. L. Whitson, C. S. Williams and J. H. Hartog were appointed a com-

mittee to adopt a uniform badge for the club.

The committee on building and loan association was increased from three to five.

A committee of three was authorized to arrange for a reception to Governor Chamberlain when he appears in Eugene on March 17 to present the colors to the new Fourth regiment.

The matter of enlarging the reception room was referred to the trustees with power to act.

The new by-laws were adopted and 300 copies ordered printed.

The matter of ornamental light poles for Willamette street was referred to a committee to confer with the light company.

The matter of proper support for the band was brought up and the concert to be given on the night of March 17 was mentioned. In a few

minutes the club members present bought over 200 tickets to the concert to show their appreciation of the band and its excellent work.
