Rann, president of the Development League, that subscriptions be taken for membership in the league, which was vigorously turned down, and upon motion of Mayor Houston to elect a temporary chairman Fred Poll was nominated and unanimously elected. Washburne was appointed by the chair on permanent organization, to solicit membership, and report at next meeting, when they will make permanent organization. On motion of W. C. Washburne the fee was put at \$5.00. On motion of C. F. Hurlburt a committee of three was appointed on bylaws, consisting of H. M. Millhorn, C. Johnson and E. M. Jackson. The committee on organization got busy at once and have 20 members to start with. The meeting adjourned until Monday, March 16th.
