PAVE ELEVENTH STREET BEFORE COMMENCEMENT

ENDEAVOR BEING MADE TO COMPLETE PAVEMENT THOROUGHFARE TO UNIVERSITY BEFORE OTHERS ARE IMPROVED—WORK BEGUN ON CURBING ON EIGHTH STREET.

Materials are being delivered on West Eighth street near Willamette in readiness to build the cement curbing for the pavement to be laid this spring. There is considerable activity around the rock crusher and the mixing plant, and both will be in operation very soon.

An endeavor will be made to have the contract for paving East Eleventh street, from Willamette street to the University, let at once so that the company may begin work on that thoroughfare before any others, in order that the pavement may be completed by commencement time at the University. This is a splendid idea. This street is the one traveled almost exclusively by people going to the University, and if the work is completed by commencement time the hundreds of visitors from outside points who will be here then will be impressed with the beauty of the street. The palms recently ordered from California will all be set out and many new cement sidewalks constructed by that time, giving the street a handsome appearance.

City Attorney Allen today placed a notice in The Guard calling for bids for the paving work. The bids to be received up to 4 o'clock March 21, at which time they will be opened and the contract at once awarded.
