### PAVE HALF BLOCK ON PATTERSON STREET

### F. E. DUNN AND F. J. HARD HAVE MADE CONTRACT WITH WARREN CONSTRUCTION COMPANY

At a meeting of the East Eleventh Street Improvement Club last night, F. E. Dunn and F. J. Hard announced that they had made a contract with the Warren Construction Company to pave that portion of Patterson street which lies between Eleventh street and the mill race and abutting on their residence properties. The distance is a little over half a block. The committee on porch lights reported that arrangements had been made with the Willamette Valley Co. for a rate of 50 cents per month for porch lights at each residence, the lights to burn all night if desired. Many who have not already will at once install the lights and from now on the street will be illuminated with them.

Eighty-five palm plants were ordered last night and more will be ordered later when other property owners are seen. They will be put in the parking between the sidewalk and curbing as soon as they arrive. F. J. Hard was appointed as a committee of one to see City Attorney Allen at once in regard to expediting the letting of the contract for the paving of Eleventh street. He saw the attorney this morning, and the latter at once prepared the proper notice to the property owners and it appears in today's Guard.

### Resolutions Adopted.

Eugene, March 10, 1908. Whereas, The Willamette Valley Company has agreed to make a special flat rate of only 50 cents a month for porch lights along East Eleventh street, the lights to be lit all night; and

Whereas, The Willamette Valley Company has also voluntarily agreed to further help the beautification of said street by painting all their poles along that street green, thereby in a large measure taking away what is now a decided detriment to the beauty of the street; be it

Resolved, That the East Eleventh Street Improvement Club in meeting assembled, that the club appreciates the Willamette Valley Company's willingness to add in civic improvement, and asks the said company to kindly arrange for both improvements at an early date as possible; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be mailed to the Mayor, of the Willamette Valley Company, in Portland, and an early reply solicited from him.
