JURY AWARDS MAHON OVER FORTY THOUSAND

LOCAL TIMBER BROKER WINS
BIG COMMISSION FROM PORT-
LAND CAPITALIST.

JURY REACHED VERDICT AFTER
MIDNIGHT, AFTER BEING OUT
OVER SIX HOURS—AWARDS
PLAINTIFF \$39,692.15, WITH
\$2,778.45 INTEREST.

The jury in the case of H. C. Mahon vs. M. B. Rankin to recover over \$40,000 as commission on the sale of large tracts of timber land in Lane county and other counties in Western Oregon, reached a verdict this morning about 12:15 o'clock, after having been out over six hours, and brought it into court sealed, following Judge Harris' instruction given last evening about 8:30 o'clock when he called the jury in for that purpose. The jury awarded Mahon the sum of \$39,692.15, with interest at 6 per cent per annum from January 15, 1907, the interest amounting to \$2,778.45, making a total sum found for the plaintiff of \$42,470.60.

The amount Mahon sued for was \$40,898.65, with interest at 6 per cent from January 15, 1907, less \$1206.50, making a total of approximately \$42,500. Thus it will be seen that the jury awarded him practically the full amount asked for.

The case was a long one, having begun last Wednesday morning and lasting until last evening about 6 o'clock, when it went to the jury. Mahon was represented as counsel by Judge M. L. Pipes, of Portland, and G. F. Skipworth, of Eugene, and the defendant by W. D. Fenton and Stapleton & Covert, both of Portland. The case has been considered a very important one and it is partly due to the splendid efforts of Attorneys Pipes and Skipworth that it was decided the way it was. The gentlemen are to be congratulated upon their victory.

EUGENE, OREGON'S
PARLOR CITY

In a recent issue of the "Independent" there appeared a suggestive and helpful editorial, entitled, "Take Care of Your Own Town." The central idea presented therein is that in the public sense the town is the home, and should be as sacredly considered as the smaller homestead. It suggested cleanliness and beauty in other cities, which became the fact. Eugene has engaged in a similar work in Oregon—a splendid work, of which the people of Eugene may feel justly proud.
