WORK ON ROAD TO BEGIN APRIL 1 AT CAPITAL CITY

There will be no forfeiture of the franchise to construct and operate in the electric railroad on the streets of Salem given by the city council to the Portland, Eugene & Eastern, says the Salem Statesman.

By the terms of the franchise granted to the company, it was required to commence operation within the city by the tenth of April. With the near approach of that date much comment has been heard on the streets as to whether the company meant business or not. Some even went so far as to surmise that the franchise would be forfeited and with it the \$5000 bond which the city required of the promoters as a guarantee of good faith.

F. W. Waters, the local representative of the company, when seen by a Statesman reporter, stated that work would commence on the new road the first week in April and that it would be pushed rapidly when once under way. The condition of the weather will be more favorable to rapid work at that time than it has been during the winter months. Mr. Waters also stated that the rails had been ordered some time and were expected to arrive in the city at almost any time. Quantities of ties have been distributed all along the proposed line of the street railway. Altogether everything looks like Salem would soon see the realization of the hope for still more electric lines.

At the same time that work commences on the line in Salem, construction will begin at Albany, where the Portland, Eugene & Eastern has a franchise similar to the one it has in this city. There is a \$5000 forfeit in the Albany franchise, too.

Another requirement contained in both franchises is that the company shall build two miles of line within eighteen months. Mr. Waters says that the two miles will be built within the required time, and more, unless the unexpected should happen.

The Portland, Eugene & Eastern is now building at Eugene to connect with some of the neighboring towns in that vicinity. Work on the main line to connect Salem with Eugene has not been commenced yet, but it is planned by the officials to have that part of the work under way in the near future.

With the completion of this line there is the pleasant prospect of having through electric communication from almost the head of the Willamette valley to the metropolis, provided the P. E. & E. and the Oregon Electric consolidate or make traffic arrangements for the running of a through train, thus providing quick and frequent transportation for the richest valley in Oregon.

GEER BELIEVES HE IS WELL GEARED

Portland, March 17.—T. T. Geer, of Pendleton, candidate for congress from the second district to succeed W. R. Ellis, is at the Perkins. Mr. Geer has just returned from a trip through a large portion of the district, and believes that he is now on the sunny side of the road with bright prospects for nomination and consequent election.

Mr. Geer believes he has lost no old friends and has made new ones in Multnomah county, where he was strong two years ago in his race for governor. He believes he will be given sufficient votes in Multnomah county to carry him through any lapse he might have by reason of the strong hold Congressman Ellis has on his home section east of the mountains.

Mr. Geer will remain in Portland tomorrow to attend the funeral of the late Judge Thomas G. Halley. He will then go to Salem for a short visit and will return to Portland and then to his home at Pendleton.

REV. PETER C. YORKE SYMPATHIZES WITH RUEF

Portland, March 17.—Noted from California to the Emerald Isle for not mincing his words in giving his opinion on any subject, Father Peter C. Yorke, in a half-hour interview this morning, avowed the pro-secession of craft in San Francisco, intimated strongly that he has no faith in Francis J. Heney and in the roughish brogue that has helped to make him famous said United States Senator Fulton was all right in his sight because "he is fighting with Heney." Father Yorke's entry to Portland yesterday morning to be the St. Patrick's day orator at the armory last night under the auspices of the Hibernians was unostentatious, only a fellow priest and Brother Andrew, of Blanchet Institute, receiving him at the depot. He was buoyant, nevertheless, breaking his fast at the Cathedral residence, pronounced himself ready to sneak to the Portland press.

"Is my hair straight?" "This was the first question put by the renowned priest and orator when he was asked to pose for the photographer. He was informed his blonde locks were not the bright hue they were when as a young man in San Francisco he stepped first into prominence as a spellbinder, but was not disarranged.

"How are conditions in San Francisco?" he was asked. "The decision of the appellate court," he continued, "as far as I could learn, is upheld by every reputable lawyer in California, and the supreme court of California, which has been bitterly attacked from so many quarters, is one that compares favorably with the supreme court of any state in the Union now, and in times past. The chief justice, Mr. Beatty, is an old-time Democrat and a Southerner, and yet has been elected and re-elected in our overwhelmingly Republican state because of the general confidence in his personal integrity and his legal knowledge.

"To my mind, the greatest and worst defect of these graft trials is, the courts are not criticized from a standpoint of law and right, but entirely from a standpoint of politics. We hang the poor, half-starved, half-crazed anarchist, but we don't hang, unfortunately, the well-dressed, well-dressed anarchist, who, because of his likes and dislikes, writes and preaches anarchy in attacking the constituted courts of the republic."

BOURKE COCHRAN WILL BE SHELVED

New York, March 16.—"The down and out for Bourke Cochran" is the word being passed down the line today by the Tammany regulars, following the displacing of the famous orator in all of the propositions of honor he has held in the "wigwam."

The action of the general committee in taking from Cochran the two remaining honors he has held, the chairmanship of the committee on speakers and legislation is construed to mean that he has been shelved, and will not be returned to congress.

Illustration of Cutting Guide for Pattern No. 2275, showing the correct way of laying out the pattern on the material, and how to use the least quantity of goods.

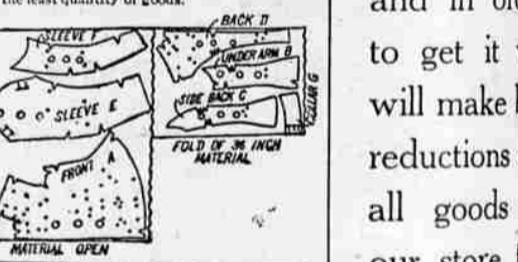
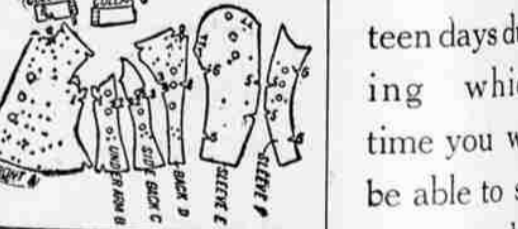


Illustration of Construction Guide for Pattern No. 2275, showing how to sew the different parts together, etc.
