## COLORS PRESENTED TO FOURTH REGT. NATIONAL GUARD

BIG EVENT IN MILITIA CIRCLES  
AT ARMORY LAST NIGHT—  
GOV. CHAMBERLAIN, TALKS  
OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON  
APPROPRIATION AND  
GIVES HIS REASON FOR VETOING IT.

The flag presentation exercises at the Armory last night were carried out as outlined in advance by The Guard yesterday. A very large crowd, one that taxed the capacity of the galleries of the armory, was present to see the ceremonies of presentation and to listen to the band concert which took place afterward. At the appointed hour three companies of Infantry, C. A. Co. C and a company made up of members of Co. E of Cottage Grove and several from the two local companies, the last named commanded by Captain Johnson, of C. E. marched into the pavilion at the command of Major C. C. Hammond. After the three companies had lined up along the main sides of the hall, the governor, his staff and the several visiting regimental officers appeared and the ceremonies of presentation were carried out.

Governor Chamberlain made a neat presentation speech and afterward took occasion to explain himself on the University of Oregon appropriation and gave his reasons for vetoing it. He stated to the audience what he did to The Guard reporter yesterday afternoon, his interview being printed in last evening's paper. He told the audience that he was friendly to the University, that he had taken no part in the referendum fight and that he would have also vetoed the Agricultural College appropriation if the bill had gone through as originally formed. Before he began his remarks on the subject he read an anonymous letter he had received after his arrival in Eugene, signed by "An Admirer," who said he was a Democrat and had always supported the governor, but wanted him to explain his apparent unfriendliness to the University and asked him why he did not send his children to the state's own educational institution instead of sending them outside of the state to receive their education. To this the governor explained that he was not able to educate his children away from home.

At his oldest son's graduation from the law department of the University of Oregon and that he was sent East to finish up his course; that as to his other children, none have attended any school but the public schools.

Colonel Geo. O. Yoran, of the Fourth regiment, accepted the colors. The following officers were present at the ceremonies:

A at the Theatre cafe and the third for Co. C at the Ideal restaurant. A delightful time was had and the visitors present at each were loud in their praises of their treatment by the local guardsmen.

## MILITARY BAND GIVES SPLENDID CONCERT

The concert given by the Eugene Military band at the armory after the flag presentation ceremonies last night was largely attended, the armory being crowded. The band rendered several excellent numbers and Frank N. McAllister and Charles Cochran pleased the audience with a baritone and cornet solo respectively. The principal feature of the whole program, however, was the vocal solo by Mrs. A. Middleton, "Blow, Blow, Thou Winter Wind." Mrs. Middleton recently arrived here from Ohio, where she was very prominent in musical circles. She has a splendid voice, one that is appreciated by the musical critics of Eugene, a number of whom were present last night. She sang as an encore "Dreaming."
