### TWO CONVICTED FOR VIOLATION OF OPTION LAW

ANDY TAYLOR AND JAPANESE PORTER FOUND GUILTY BY JURIES—CASE OF CITY VS. H. R. KINCAID BEING TRIED IN CIRCUIT COURT THIS AFTERNOON

The jury in the case of the state vs. Harry Kennedy, the Jap. accused of selling liquor at the Hotel Gross, returned a verdict of guilty last evening and Judge Harris set Thursday morning at 9 o'clock as the time for sentence. The Andy Taylor liquor case was resumed this morning and the jury completed. The jury chosen was as follows: P. J. Bolan, J. M. Gearhart, Rufus Robertson, J. N. Cole, W. L. Wheeler, Charles Dickerson, L. B. Rossman, E. W. Michael, H. Y. Porter, Clarence Koon, H. E. Morris, H. B. Dunlap.

The jury was out an hour or more and returned a verdict of guilty. Sentence will be pronounced Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Kincaid, commonly known as the Olive street case, in which Kincaid took an appeal from the award made by the board of viewers in fixing the damages to his property in the opening of Olive street from West Twelfth to West Seventeenth streets, was called after the Taylor jury had gone out.
