LOGGING TO BE RESUMED ON THE COLUMBIA

Logging operations throughout the Columbia river district are expected to open up within the next two or three weeks, but as yet no orders have been placed with employment agencies for loggers, says the Portland Journal. About 3000 men would be needed to supply all the camps with normal forces. It is said that white labor is scarce, because many of the men have drifted to other parts since the shutting down of outdoor work last fall.

Wages for loggers, which last year ranged from \$2.25 to \$3.75 per day, will this season start at \$2 to \$3.25. There are plenty of foreigners available for common labor, but logging bosses usually prefer native born help.

Logging camps are already being operated by the large Portland mills that draw their supplies from the Columbia river territory. These camps have been running most of the winter. The Chapman Logging Company near Warren is in full operation. Benson's logging operations in a very large camp on the Clatskanie have not ceased all winter. The O. K. Company is preparing to open a large camp near Marshland. The Eastern & Western Lumber Company has been operating steadily near Ranier and so has the Inman-Poulsen Company near Kelso.

A labor employment agency that handles orders in season for large numbers of loggers, said:

"Thus far we have had no intimation that the logging camps generally would open. There have been no orders placed with us to indicate more than a small demand here and there for help to fill vacancies. White laborers have left this part of the country in large numbers last fall, and it looks to us as if there would be a scarcity of labor in and around Portland this spring, if work opens up very generally. There are plenty of foreigners on hand, and these will be employed at somewhat lower wages than were paid last year."

SEND TRACK TEAM TO COLUMBIA MEET

The University track outlook is brightening up a little owing to the fact that new men are turning out daily. Last night an extra large bunch was out, and although there are no bright particular stars among them the prospects for a well-balanced team are improving. The try-out for the Columbia indoor meet will be held April 4. The meet comes a week earlier this year, April 11. A good-sized squad will be taken to Columbia by Trainer Hayward, as many of the new men are given their first experience in this meet. Last year the first and second place men in all events were taken.
