MATERIALS FOR BUILDING WILL BE MUCH LOWER

CHEAPER THIS SEASON THAN FOR SEVERAL YEARS OR THAN THEY WILL PROBABLY EVER BE AGAIN—CIRCULAR FROM LUMBER MANUFACTURERS' ASSOCIATIONS

Following is a part of a circular issued during the fore part of this month by the Northern Pine Manufacturers' Association and the North-western Hemlock Manufacturers' Association at Minneapolis, and applies to the situation on the coast as well as to the territory around Minneap-olis:

It is generally conceded that build- ing will be much cheaper the coming season than for several years, or than it probably ever will be again.

There has been a reduction in the price of nearly all classes of building materials from the high range of values prevailing a year ago.

The greatest percentage of reduction in cost will be noticeable in small construction, such as dwellings, be- cause the proportion of lumber used in such buildings is greater here than in large buildings used for commer- cial purposes.

All kinds of lumber have declined in price, averaging from \$2 per thou- sand on Northern pine, \$5 to \$7 on yellow pine and hemlock, \$6 on West- ern lumber, and \$1.50 to \$4 on hard- woods, less than a year ago.

Shingles, red cedar, extra "A," have declined 70 cents per thou- sand, and clear 45c per thousand, since last March.

Cement has declined from 2 5/16 35 per cent in price during the year. A year ago the city of Minneapolis placed a contract for a large amount of cement at \$1.70 per barrel; this year the contract was placed at \$1.12 per barrel. Retail prices have de- clined from 38 1/2 to 50 cents per bar- rel.

Brick (common) averages \$1 per thousand less than last season.

Building stone has been reduced about ten per cent in value.

Window glass is lower by ten per cent than last year.

Plasters are ten to twenty per cent below last year's figures.

Hardware shows a considerable de- cline in some items, being about ten to twenty per cent on the whole on builders' hardware.

Plumbing goods are from ten to twelve and a half per cent less.

Structural iron shows slight reduc- tion in price but not in proportion to the marked decline in pig iron. Pig- No. 2 Clain, pig iron sold a year ago February 20 for \$26; this year same date for \$15.75.

Labor is taking some less wages; common labor is now available for \$1.85 to \$2.25 last year. There has been no reduction in the scale of skilled labor in the cities as yet; in the small towns carpenters and brick layers are working for less.
