BELIEVE ORCHARD WILL BE PARDONED

Denver, March 18.—"I know nothing about what will be done with Harry Orchard," said James McParland, the detective who secured the confession of Orchard, today. "He was never promised any immunity and never asked any. I do not know whether his sentence will be commuted or not. He is guilty and he has confessed his guilt. He has told all he knew about those who caused him to commit his crimes. The fact that they were cleared by juries makes no difference to him."

Ernest Mills, acting secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, said today that the Federation would remain passive in regard to the disposition of Orchard's case.

"If Judge Wood made the statement credited to him," said Mr. Mills, "there is little doubt but that he is paving the way for freedom for Orchard. It has been claimed all along that Orchard had been promised freedom by Governor Gooding, of Idaho, for making the confessions he made at the trials. That the political ring back of it has promised to go down the line for Orchard is also a well-known fact."
