## LAND GRANT RESOLUTION IS SURE TO PASS

Washington, March 21.—The house committee on public lands today authorized a favorable report on the senate resolution authorizing the attorney general to bring suit to recover two million acres of land from the California & Oregon Railroad Company, controlled by the Southern Pacific. This land, it is charged, was acquired by the company by grant from the government on condition that it be sold at \$2.50 an acre. It is asserted that the company has refused to so dispose of the land.

## TRAIN ROBBERS ESCAPE FROM HELENA JAIL

Helena, March 21.—George Frankhauser and Charles McDonald, alleged

Great Northern train robbers, who last September held up the Oriental Limited and rifled the registered mail of \$40,000, broke jail this morning and are still at liberty. The men sawed through their cell doors, the corridor bars and the bars in the window. Posses are in pursuit.

The escapees scaled a high wall after cutting through their cell doors and the bars and jumped fifteen feet into an alley way. It is believed they had the assistance of a confederate inside the jail.

## LANE DEMOCRATS HOLD MEETING AND RESOLVE

ENDORSE BRYAN, STATEMENT NO. 1, AND THE UNIVERSITY APPROPRIATION

CANDIDATES MENTIONED FOR VARIOUS OFFICES TO BE FILLED THIS YEAR—J. M. KITCHEN ENDORSED FOR COUNTY TREASURER—OTHER NAMES MERELY SUGGESTED

The Lane county Democratic central committee met in Eugene today, passed resolutions, suggested several persons as suitable candidates for the various offices to be filled this year and took preliminary steps toward organizing a Bryan club and auxiliary Democratic clubs in every precinct in the county.

The meeting was called to order at 10 o'clock this forenoon by Chairman L. M. Travis and J. C. Veatch, of Cottage Grove, acted as secretary. Speeches were made by several of the thirty-five or forty war horses present and committees were then appointed as follows:

Committee on resolutions—E. P. Williams, J. D. Matlock, J. J. Walton, C. P. Houston, J. C. Veatch.

Committee on candidates—L. L. Stevens, J. M. Francis, R. M. Veatch.

Resolutions Adopted. The meeting then adjourned until 1 o'clock this afternoon, at which time Chairman Travis called it to order and the committee on resolutions reported as follows, the report being unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The paramount issue in the coming campaign in this state involves the election of United States senators by the direct vote of the people; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the Democrats of Lane county, are in favor of Statement No. 1 and hereby pledge ourselves to support no candidate who does not favor this measure; be it further

Resolved, That we are in favor of the \$125,000 appropriation for the maintenance of the State University; be it further

Resolved, That W. J. Bryan be endorsed as candidate for president.

Candidates Suggested. The committee on candidates reported the names of several persons who would acceptably fill the offices of the county if elected, but no official action was taken except to endorse the name of J. M. Kitchen, of Irving, for county treasurer, the others being simply suggestions by the committee and by the meeting. Following are some of the suggestions:

For sheriff—H. L. Bown, of Eugene.

For clerk—Henry Stewart, of Springfield.

For assessor—Welby Stevens, of Springfield.

For school superintendent—J. J. Bryan, of Springfield.

For coroner—Dr. W. L. Cheshire, of Eugene.

For surveyor—Simon Klov Dahl, of Eugene.

S. M. Douglas, of Springfield, was mentioned for county judge, but he declined to run. He was also mentioned for commissioner, and this was also declined. J. H. McMahon was suggested for judge, but he, too, declined to make the run. The matter of naming candidates for these two offices was referred to the central committee.

The chair was authorized to appoint a committee to look into the matter of selecting candidates for the legislature and to report at a mass meeting to be held soon. It is said that a meeting of Statement No. 1 advocates from both parties will be called for next Saturday. The committee appointed is as follows: F. L. Armitage, A. J. Pickard and G. F. Skippworth.

Of the above-named persons who have been suggested for office, Harry L. Bown has announced his intention of running for sheriff, and Welby Stevens has filed his petition for the nomination of assessor.

It was decided to form a Bryan club at a mass meeting to be held on Saturday, April 11.

## FOUR INDICTMENTS AGAINST SCHMITZ ARE DISMISSED

## PRESIDENT AND LEADERS OF CONGRESS CONFER

Washington, March 21.—An important conference was held at the White House today. The president summoned Senator Aldrich and Representatives Payne, Dalzell and Hepburn for the purpose of consulting them as to the legislative program, which it is understood includes measures amendatory to the employers' liability act, the bill modifying the power of injunction, the Aldrich financial bill, Hepburn's proposition to amend the Sherman anti-trust law and a proposition to prosecute the tariff inquiry during the recess of congress.

## MEXICO INTERFERES WITH TRADING SHIP

San Francisco, March 21.—The gasoline schooner Nellie arrived in port last night from Magdalena Bay, where she became involved with the Mexican customs authorities. The vessel was chartered by enterprising men who stocked her with shoes, candy, fresh fruits and various merchandise to sell to the sailors of the fleet, which were selling fast when the Mexican authorities interfered, owing to the fact that the consular invoice had been neglected. The matter was settled, but most of the profits of the voyage went with the settlement.

New York, March 21.—Duke d'Abruzzi, reported engaged to marry Miss Katherine Elkins, sailed for Europe today on the steamer Lusitania. He refused to deny or affirm his engagement, but his demeanor is regarded by reporters as not that of a man who has fallen on an important mission.

To escape the public gaze d'Abruzzi left Washington in an automobile, and went to Baltimore. It is believed he was accompanied by Miss Elkins, and that they were joined by Senator Elkins, who was in that city yesterday to attend the funeral of the late Senator Whyte, and that the Duke took the train from Baltimore for New York.
