## JUDGE REFUSES TO GRANT ALIA ANOTHER TRIAL

Denver, March 21.—Judge Whitford today denied the motion for a new trial for Anarchist Alia, who will be hanged during the week beginning July 12 next.

Last night Alia made repeated attempts to suicide, beating his head against the iron bars of his cell. His head was covered with bruises and when brought into court this morning was so weak he had to be supported.

There is no likelihood of an appeal to the supreme court, as Alia has no funds and there has been no proof introduced of errors in the trial.

## SHIP SUBSIDY GRAFT PASSED BY SENATE

Washington, March 21.—The ship subsidy bill was passed by the senate today. It pays to 16-knot vessels sailing between this country and South America, the Philippines, Japan, China and Australia \$4 per mile, the amount awarded by the act of 1891 to vessels of 20 knots only.

The bill was amended so that 12-knot vessels will receive \$2 per mile, which is the allowance under the existing law to 16-knot vessels.

## BURGLARS CRACK DRAIN P. O. SAFE

Drain, Or., March 20.—Burglars last night looted the Drain postoffice, which occupies a portion of Benton Mires' store. Entrance was effected by cutting a hole through the panel of the rear door, thus permitting the springing of the lock. The postoffice safe was opened by knocking off the combination knob and dial. It yielded in coin and currency over \$150, about \$60 of which sum belonged personally to Postmaster Hazard. A sack of copper cents was unmolested. The burglars also r-

fled the store tills, but secured only a small amount of change. The tools used by the burglars were stolen from the blacksmith shop of Bohm & Sons, near Mires' store. There is not the slightest clue to either their identity or whereabouts.

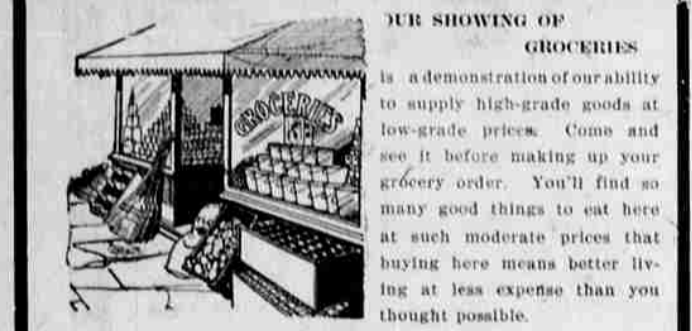
