## COTTAGE GROVE GETTING THE PAVING FEVER

REPRESENTATIVE OF WARREN CONSTRUCTION COMPANY CONFERS WITH BUSINESS MEN OF THAT CITY

He estimates the total cost of the work on Main street from the depot to the bridge, including the curbing, at \$16,000. This amount of money could not be expended in a more judicious and practical manner in this city. Ben Lurch, H. O.
