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## COL. WATTERSON SAYS BRYAN WILL DEFEAT TAFT

Havana, March 21.—Bryan and Taft will be the rival nominees for president of the United States and the issue will hang in doubt. Eventually the money interests will come to the support of Bryan in the hope of administering a rebuff to Roosevelt.

These are the prophesies of Colonel Henry Watterson, editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, in a remarkable interview given out here tonight.

"Who will be the Democratic nominee?" was asked.

"William Jennings Bryan," came the quick reply.

"Who will be the Republican nominee?"

"Secretary of War William H. Taft," was the equally firm reply.

"Who will be elected?"

"Anything is possible with Almighty God," was the reply.

"If hard times continue Bryan will be the next president. No party can stand against hard times. Secretary Taft is one of the best men in the country, but that issue is always predominant in American politics."

"What about the great capitalistic interests—who will they favor?"

"In my opinion the great capitalistic interests will in the end be for William J. Bryan."

"Why so?"

"Because, if Taft is elected, he will stand charged with carrying out Theodore Roosevelt's policies, and the Republican senate will be reduced in obedience to him."

"The corporations then," he continued, "will have nothing to hope for, but if Colonel Bryan is successful, his election will be a rebuff to Roosevelt and all the president stands for—that is to say, it will be a vindication of conservative Republicanism. The Republican party will then reorganize in the senate and Bryan will be helpless. In my judgment, the whole money interests will eventually support Bryan as a choice of evils."

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## REMAINS ARRIVE FROM PORTLAND

The remains of George Mayer, a former resident of Eugene, who died in Portland a few days ago, arrived here this afternoon and were buried here in the Masonic cemetery. A delegation from the local lodge of Masons, of which Mr. Mayer was a member, met the remains at the train and escorted them to the cemetery, the Masons and friends going out on the street car. Undertakers Day & Henderson had charge of the funeral. Mr. Mayer was the father of Mrs. Weidemann, who resided for many years at the corner of West Seventh and Olive streets, leaving here about ten years ago. He lived with his daughter and left when she died.

## YOUNG LADY BEATS DR. TANNER'S RECORD

Long Beach, Cal., March 21.—Miss Etta Priscilla Grove, the Chicago school teacher, broke her fast today after having equalled the record of Dr. H. S. Tanner, who was made famous in 1878 by 40 days of abstinence. Fearing that her weakened condition might bring on a total collapse at any minute the plucky young woman decided that she had achieved quite enough, and this morning, before daylight, drank a glass of condensed milk.

Notwithstanding her fear of collapse, Miss Grove took a plunge in the icy surf at 10 o'clock in the presence of several hundred people.

Tipping the beam at 123 pounds on the first day of her fast, Miss Grove weighed 105 pounds today but her face shows no signs of emaciation and it is hard to tell from her outward appearance that she has been living on water, with a little orange, during her fast.

She required only about half as much sleep as usual, sleeping only four and five hours nightly.
