### LARGE GLASS TO BE INITIATED AT ARMORY

### DIED.

Mrs. J. S. Luckey, a pioneer resident of Eugene, died at her home at the corner of East Tenth and Pearl streets in Eugene Monday afternoon, after a long illness from heart trouble.

Mrs. Elizabeth Caroline Luckey was the daughter of Elias Stewart and Elizabeth Stewart, and was born in Buchanan county, Missouri, February 20, 1851, making her age at her death 57 years, 1 month and 3 days.

In 1852, while yet an infant, she came with her parents across the plains to Oregon. The mother of the family was taken with cholera while on the plains of the Platte in Western Nebraska, and Lizzie was thus left an orphan very early in life.

She reached Oregon in 1852 and lived on the C. A. C. farm near Springfield until her father purchased part of the C. A. C. farm near Springfield, to which they moved, and her home has been in Eugene ever since.

July 23, 1871, she was married to Joseph S. Luckey. Besides her husband she leaves two sisters, Mrs. T. G. Henderson and Mrs. A. O. Stevens.

Mrs. Luckey was beloved by all who knew her, and she was an especial friend of the young people, a large number of the students of the University of Oregon often accepting her hospitality at her splendid home.

She was prominent in Eugene's social life and will be greatly missed at society functions. The funeral was held this afternoon at the remains interred in the Masonic cemetery, Rev. P. K. Hammond, pastor of St. Mary's Episcopal church, conducting the services.

The services were largely attended and many followed the remains to their last resting place.

In Eugene, March 23, 1908, Mrs. Margaret A. Parks, aged 84 years, 4 months and 3 days.

Mrs. Margaret A. Parks was born in Fulton county, Illinois, November 20, 1824, and in 1852, with her parents, she crossed the plains when but twelve years old. They settled at Pleasant Hill, where she spent most of her life.

She was married in 1858 to J. N. Parks, who died March 10, 1886. There are eight living children, all of whom were present at the time of her death: Samuel A., Albert L., Edwin, Anna V., Lloyd L., Claude C., Mrs. Elsie C. Cooper and Clyde L., all of whom are residents of Lane county.

She also leaves the following brothers and sisters: Daniel Baughman, of Cottage Grove; Mrs. S. A. Lawrence, of Nome, Alaska; Mrs. E. Deering, of Helix, Or.; E. G. Baughman, of Seattle, and Thurston Baughman, of Cosman, Cal.

The funeral was held this forenoon with interment in the Pleasant Hill cemetery, Rev. J. S. McCallum conducting the services.

Samuel Holloway, a pioneer of Lane county, formerly residing in Eugene, died at Goshen March 24, 1908. The funeral will be held Wednesday, with interment in the Eugene E. O. F. cemetery. The services will be held in the M. E. church at Goshen and the remains will arrive at the cemetery about noon.

At the home of J. H. Dick, 216 Lawrence street, March 24, 1908, Lydia A., wife of A. J. Adams, aged 56 years. Cause of death, paralysis. She was the mother of ten children and a pioneer of Jacksonville, Or. The funeral will be held Wednesday from 216 Lawrence street at 2 p. m., with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

### ELEVENTH STREET PAVING CONTRACT LET LAST NIGHT

The city council held an adjourned session last night at which time the Warren Construction Company's bid for paving East Eleventh street from Willamette street to the S. P. railroad for \$2.75 per square yard was accepted. This bid was made with the provision that the company be allowed to put in curbing of the same quality that is now being put in and not be compelled to conform to the specifications furnished by the city engineer for building of said curb.

Ordinances for grading and graveling East Seventeenth street from Walnut avenue to Azate avenue, for grading and graveling East Nineteenth street from Orchard avenue to Agate avenue, for grading and graveling Orchard avenue from East Eleventh street to Fairmount boulevard, and for grading and graveling Moss avenue from East Fifteenth street to Fairmount boulevard were passed. An ordinance providing for building inspection in the city was passed. An ordinance regulating blasting in the city was read for the first time.

### MR. CAKE ADDRESSES A EUGENE AUDIENCE

Hon. H. M. Cake, Republican candidate for United States senator, delivered an address to a good-sized crowd at the courthouse last night. He was introduced by M. Svarverud, who acted as chairman of the meeting. Mr. Cake dwelt at length on Statement No. 1, upon which platform he is standing.

He gave his views on that subject in a clear and concise manner, and impressed all who heard him with his earnestness. He said there would be no question about the highest number of votes being cast for a Republican candidate, with the 30,000 or more Republican majority in the state.

Mr. Cake touched on national and state affairs, and the address, taken as a whole, was a well-rounded Republican political speech.
