SCADDING TO LECTURE ON FRENCH CATHEDRALS

Bishop Scadding will tomorrow morning give one of his famous lime-light lectures on the assembly hall of churches and cathedrals of France. Last year the bishop delivered a similar lecture at the University to a crowded house, and received high recommendations.

The speaker is deeply interested in the University, and the faculty and students think very highly of him. He is doing much in the fight for the appropriation, and believes Oregon will win out.

While the lecture will be illustrated by the stereopticon it may be that the audience will also be given a splendid outside view of the feeling over the state in regard to the 'varsity. His lecture on the churches of France is very well spoken of by papers in the East, where the bishop has delivered the lecture many times.

SENATOR BOURNE AWARDS HIS PRIZE

Washington, March 23.—The prize of \$1000 offered by Senator Bourne of Oregon to the author of the best written argument on the subject of "Why Roosevelt Should be Chosen for a Second Executive Term" has been won by Frank H. Norcross, associate justice of the supreme court of Nevada.

The announcement that Justice Norcross has won the big prize was made today. Senator Bourne says that Justice Norcross' argument is an excellent piece of work, and that it will be circulated and widely published to educate the people. He is one of the most enthusiastic third-termers.

HEARST'S CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENCY

New York, March 23.—Thomas L. Hiseen, who was the Hearst candidate for governor of Massachusetts, has been sprung by the Hearst papers as a likely candidate for president on the Independence League ticket. However, there is a string to the boom, as Mr. Hearst may be the candidate himself.

The league will hold its convention immediately following the Denver convention. Mr. Hiseen has become prominent through his attacks upon the Standard Oil Company and other corporations.

His parents are Germans, and the trouble his father had with the Standard Oil caused the son to fight that corporation at every opportunity.

Lebanon has passed an ordinance making it a misdemeanor for a physician to give a false prescription regarding the health of a person in order that he may secure a liquor prescription. It also has an ordinance making it a misdemeanor to become intoxicated.

After several hours of spirited discussion over the proposition to abolish 17 of the 18 pension agencies and consolidate the pension disbursements in Washington, the house passed the pension appropriation carrying \$150,869,000, the largest sum ever authorized by that measure.

RAILS FOR ALBANY'S STREET CAR LINE

A. Welch, manager of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railroad, was in the city yesterday, says the Albany Democrat. Mr. Welch reported that the rails would be in Albany within ten days for the Albany system. He said, though, that he had already been notified by Mr. Hirschberg, of the horse car system, that if he attempted to lay any track he would contest it, which would mean a fight and perhaps a delay. It is thought the Welch people will win out, as the old street car franchise might have been forfeited years ago, the terms never having been fulfilled. It is declared by many.

Mr. Welch stated that it is proposed to have cars running from Albany to Salem by the end of the year. In addition it is said the company is securing rights of way from Eugene east over the mountains.

The Oregon Electric Company is also coming south from Salem, and a report is current that it will cross the mountains from Albany by way of Lebanon and Cascade.

The street car situation looks pretty good.
