The First National Bank closed this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock out of respect to the memory of Mrs. J. S. Luckey, whose funeral was held this afternoon.

A very considerable fall in the barometer preceded the wind of this morning. The aneroid last evening stood at 29.85, falling by morning five and one-half points, to 29.30.
