RAILROADS ARE "GETTING BACK" AT THE PUBLIC

Chicago, March 24.—Consideration of a carefully worked out scheme to "get-back" at the public for the recent anti-railroad legislation—the two-cent fare laws and the activity of the interstate commerce commission—is believed to be back of the meeting to be called here today of the Trans-Continental Passenger Association.

Curtailment of all extra expenses, and the abolition of special privileges and courtesies is to be the watchword, and the public be hanged the rallying cry, according to some of those in a position to know.

As a starter on the new policy it is reported that all specially conducted tours and excursion bureaus will be cut out. The tourist will be forced to make his trips without the little extra frills and luxuries that have been thrown in. Another reported retrenchment, if carried out, will see the abolition of folder boxes now maintained in all hotels and railway stations. Excursions and excursion rates are to be greatly reduced in numbers, and special privileges are to be curtailed.

It is said that the railway magnates have decided that the easiest way to bring the public to time and check the wave of hostile feeling against the roads is to make them appreciate how well they have been treated in the past.

MYSTERY OF DE SAGAN'S MOVEMENTS UNSOLVED

New York, March 24.—Not only New York, but Washington, is today mixing in the game of "Sagan, Sagan, who's got de Sagan?"

No two New York papers agree as to the latest score in the semi-finals of Anna Gould's second international love match. All agree that Madame Anna is leading, but opinions differ as to where the prince stands in the race. He has been "positively identified" today in half a dozen different cities, ranging from Paris and Montreal to New York and Washington.

The one fact certainly established is that George Gould, who is acting in the capacity of referee, is holding on to the gate receipts, otherwise known as the Gould millions. There is a general impression among the wise ones of New York's four hundred that brother George may call it "no contest."
