AGAIN PLOWING UP STREETS TO LAY PAVEMENT

From now on throughout the spring and summer the work of paving Eugene's streets will be carried on. The big roller was steamed up this afternoon and hitched to the "potter" and the work of excavating for the pavement on East Eighth street was begun. The work attracted a large crowd all afternoon, and as usual there were a great many who would "boss" the job. The company will have no trouble in securing men for the work, as there are a good many who are art idle now. The wages will be considerably lower than they were last year. When the work of laying the bitumints begins the company will employ between 75 and 100 men all told.

McClanahan goes to Portland in the morning to receive two carloads of incubators which arrived today from the East. The rain has given way to good weather again and all building operations which were stopped yesterday have been resumed. There will be no skating for the public on Thursday evening of this week, the Underwood rink having been rented to a private party. G. W. Taylor has just completed a fine well for Percy Long at his home on Oak street, going down 163 feet and obtaining an excellent flow of good water. The "Burgomaster" troupe arrived here on the Astoria local today at noon. They took a special train out of Medford last night in order to catch the local for Eugene. L. O. Beckwith has sold the residence on his lot which he will cover with a reinforced concrete business building this spring to Clarence Fisk, who will move it to a lot owned by him on West Sixth street beyond Blair. P. G. Bradway left today with his wife for St. Martin's springs in hope of benefiting his wife's health. She had the typhoid fever two years ago and has been unable to use her lower limbs since. Isaac H. Wing has begun suit in the circuit court against Fred Fischer and Fred Fischer, Jr., to recover the sum of \$1000 with interest at 7 per cent from August 12, 1901, on a promissory note. L. M. Travis is attorney for the plaintiff. A girl was born to Josie Wilson, one of the members of the pony ballet in "The Dream City," at the Eugene hospital Saturday. Her husband is a vaudeville artist in an Eastern circuit. She will remain in hospital as soon as she is able to leave the hospital. A meeting of the building and loan association committee of the Commercial club will be held tomorrow at 7:30 o'clock and the committee on the better lighting of Willamette street and keeping the store windows lighted at night will meet at 8:15 the same evening. William Kahler has begun suit in the circuit court against Fred Kahler to recover \$77.60. He alleges that on April 9, 1903, the justice's court awarded him that amount of damages from the defendant and the sum has not yet been paid. L. M. Travis is attorney for the plaintiff. A meeting of the Lane County Bar Association was held last night and officers elected as follows: President, E. O. Potter; vice president, J. M. Williams; secretary, J. M. Pipes; treasurer, G. F. Skipworth. A reso-

lution was adopted unanimously endorsing the appropriation for the University. The funeral of Mrs. Lydia A. Adams was held this afternoon and the remains interred in the L. O. F. cemetery. The University of Idaho debating team arrived here this afternoon to debate with the University of Oregon team tomorrow night. The street cars to the University will run every fifteen minutes tomorrow night in order to accommodate those wishing to attend the Oregon-Idaho debate at Villard hall. J. Goldsmith is packing the fixtures in his branch cigar store in the Coleman building and will ship them to John Lynch, at Drain. The stairway to the upper stories of the building will be located where the store now is. N. H. Martin, of Cottage Grove, was today appointed administrator of the estate of Nathaniel Martin, who died January 9, 1908. The estimated value of the property of the estate is \$1500. W. F. Hart, John Allen and N. P. Chrisman were appointed appraisers. The funeral of Samuel Holloway was held at Goshen this forenoon and the remains interred in the Eugene L. O. F. cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. D. H. Trimble and attended by a large number of the members of the G. A. R., Mr. Holloway being a veteran of the civil war. Attorney Jesse G. Wells has purchased the F. S. Smith residence on College Hill and after making some improvements to the property will move his family there. This is the finest house on the hill. The Garret Real Estate Co. made the sale. The consideration is not given out for publication. W. J. Gibson & Son are preparing to enlarge the Bee Hive grocery at West Eighth and Charrelton streets, by occupying the adjoining room recently vacated by Ludford & Haskell. This grocery firm is building up a large business and carries a fine line of new and first-class goods, which are very neatly displayed in their store. J. Kavanaugh, manager of the Singer Sewing Machine company's office in this city, says he will pay a reward of \$5 for the arrest and conviction of the person who stole the big Singer calendar from the postoffice lobby last night. The fellow has already got 8 months and 6 days' time and Kavanaugh says he will get more if he can find out who he is. Dr. Made, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Cottage Grove, will speak at the Christian church Friday evening under the auspices of the Eugene Christian Endeavor union. Dr. Made was a prominent endeavor worker in the East for several years and had the enviable distinction of having the largest membership of any society in his state. He is said to be an able speaker and the Eugene union is fortunate in securing his services. Deputy Sheriff C. C. Hammond was severely bitten on one of his legs by Andy Taylor's dog last evening. Mrs. Taylor wished to talk to her husband, who is serving a term in the county jail for violating the local option law, and as he was unlocking the door to admit her the dog made a savage attack upon him, badly tearing his trousers and sinking his teeth into the flesh of his leg. Deputy Hammond immediately went to a physician and had the wound burned out so as to avoid blood poisoning. Snow appeared on the top of Spencer's Butte and other high elevations this morning. The night was cold and no doubt while it was raining here yesterday and last night the snow piled up high in the mountains. Superintendent L. R.
