

MEAT PRICES SOAR IN CHICAGO AND NEW YORK

New York, March 26.—Retail prices of meats of all grades have increased two cents per pound since the past week and it is likely that a further advance of from three to five cents will result from the shortage in meat cattle. It may be necessary to import sheep and cattle from Australia, England and Argentina to supply the demand.

FARMERS WILL NOT BENEFIT BY RAISE

Chicago, March 26.—Farmers who are in receipt for the Chicago market will not benefit by the increased price of meat except veal has increased the past two days from one to five cents a pound, but during the recent financial flurry the farmers shipped all their available stock to the market and the supply is much depleted.

STEVENS DEATH PLEASES ASSASSIN

San Francisco, March 26.—The remains of Darham White Stevens, the diplomat shot by a Korean Monday, dying last night, will be held pending the arrival of relatives from the East.

San Francisco, March 26.—I. Wang Chang and Ming Wun Chun, the Koreans who were selected to kill Stevens for what they believed was his treachery to the Hermit Kingdom, were today charged with murder.

A movement is on foot among the Japanese to erect a monument to Stevens, who was greatly admired by them. The plans are in a tentative state and whether the monument will be erected in San Francisco, Tokio or Seoul has not been determined.

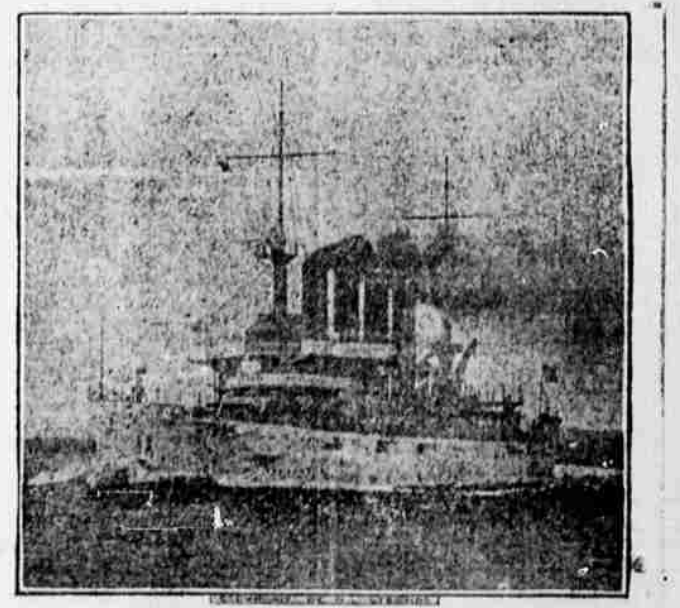

THE FASTEST AMERICAN CRUISER.

At her recent trial cruise off the Virginia capes the new armored cruiser North Carolina made a new speed record for armored vessels of the American navy, her time being 22.48 knots an hour. This swift and powerful monster is of the latest design in naval architecture and is capable of destroying all the commerce of the Atlantic ocean if war prevailed and such a thing were necessary. The North Carolina cost \$4,400,000. She is 502 feet long and has four ten-inch breechloading rifles, sixteen six-inch rapid fire guns and a secondary battery of forty-six pieces.
