PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, March 26.—A late issue of the New York Commercial says of the New York apple market: "There is a large accumulation of apples on hand in this market, and on all offerings the tone is weak. Dealers here do not hesitate to assure that the losses made by speculators and holders at primary points will be large, and it is freely predicted that the total will exceed \$1,000,000 on the 1907 crop. There are few apples on this market that sell for \$4.50 per barrel. The bulk of the sales are within a range of \$2 to \$3 per barrel, few lots, however, reaching the outside figure. The market has been demoralized by the heavy stocks of low-grade fruit. Egg Bears Outdo Themselves. Just as has been predicted the egg bears—members of the Knockers' Club—have outdone even themselves and suffering from defeat they are planning new schemes to secure additional profit out of shippers. As forecasted in this report, the egg market went no lower than 15c on the present movement and today no sales are being made at that low figure. The market now ranges at 15 1-2 and 16 cents with sales at both figures. The disposition among the bears here to beat down the price too far resulted in many shippers taking the matter into their own hands and storage operations by valley shippers have begun in earnest. This Opposite Tone in Chickens. Chickens are by somewhat more liberal arrivals though the market is far from being glutted. Some sales are being made at a fractional decline for old hens but springers are in demand at top figures. Demand for best quality turkeys is very good at fair prices. Butter is Very Scarce Here. Supplies of local butter are very small in comparison to the demand which has ruled since the last cut in prices. Best grade is almost unobtainable and it is stated that in a few instances a fractional advance in prices has been asked. In order to relieve the shortage to some extent a larger volume of California butter is being brought to this market. This sells at the same price as the local product; a condition that very seldom rules here.
