

## STANFORD CLUB OF PORTLAND URGES RADICAL ACTION

Portland, March 27.—The Stanford Club of Portland today ordered a telegram to be sent to the faculty, the student affairs committee and to the student body of Stanford University, urging the latter to radical action and asking the former for more thorough investigation and to show greater leniency. Their action was taken when it was found that the board of trustees has no power. It was the original intention to go over the head of President Jordan and address the trustees, but it was found that the latter has no power.

### WALK OUT WITHOUT THE 250 SIGNATURES

Stanford University, March 27.—There is still some doubt as to the outcome of the action of the student body yesterday in regard to the agreement for 250 students to walk

out as a protest. Those in charge of the agreement will not give the number of signatures, but it is known that nearly the required number have signed. A meeting will be held this afternoon to decide whether to walk out without the full 250 signatures.

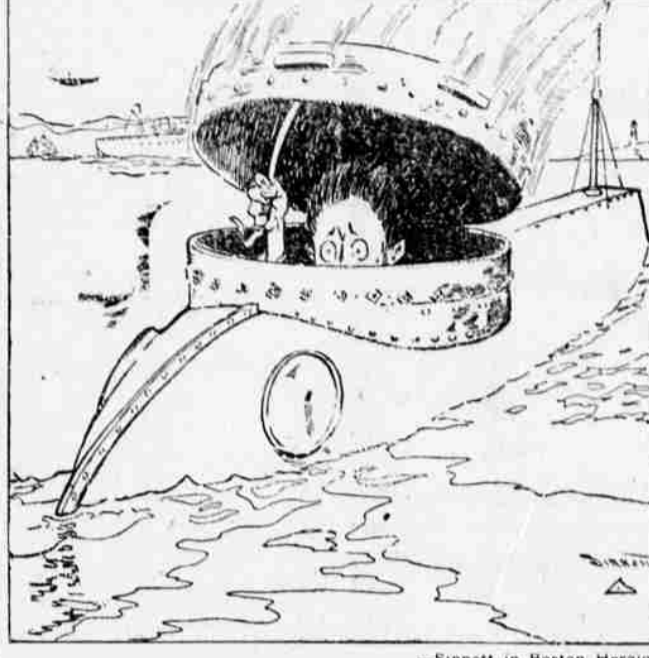
### WEATHER FORECAST FOR PACIFIC NORTHWEST

### STANFORD STUDENTS THREATEN TO QUIT

Stanford University, Cal., March 26.—Chaos reigns here today over the action of the faculty committee in suspending 41 students, all upper classmen, who participated in the recent demonstration against the anti-liquor edict. Other students of the college are taking out leaves of absence never to return. The trouble is not due directly to the rules against the use of liquor, but to the denial of the right of appeal on part of the students from the arbitrary rulings of the committee on student affairs, which has long been unpopular. It is rumored that some of the faculty favor the students and a serious split may result. The matter is complicated by the illness of President David Starr Jordan, who, it is reported, has appendicitis.

## MEXICO TOWN DESTROYED BY AN EARTHQUAKE

CHILAPA, IN STATE OF GUERRERO, STRICKEN AND IS NOW BURNING

WHOLE POPULACE IS TERRORIZED—NOT KNOWN HOW MANY LIVES WERE LOST—TWO QUAKES RECORDED AT THE WEATHER BUREAU IN CHICAGO LAST NIGHT

Mexico City, March 27.—The town of Chilapa, in the state of Guerrero, was completely destroyed by an earthquake last night, and the whole city is burning. The populace is terror-stricken. It is not known even approximately how many lives were lost. Chilapa is a city of fifteen thousand inhabitants.

## CRAWFORD'S WILL WAS A FORGERY

Schooley was arrested some time ago for forging the will, and had been surrendered today. A detective has gone to Noxen, Pa., to rearrest him.

## AMBASSADORSHIP QUESTION HOLDS INTEREST AT BERLIN

Berlin, March 27.—The matter of acceptance by the German government of David Jayne Hill as American ambassador continues to hold public interest here. The foreign office deals with the affair by denying that any explanation, adverse to Hill has come from the German side, declaring he is persona non grata and that all statements of a contrary nature are inventions put into circulation by designing Americans, and that opposition to Hill is American, and not German. On the other hand, it is known that certain members of the official household are opposed to Hill. Mr. Tower's part, it is explained, has been confined to a transmittal to Roosevelt of the emperor's definite communication. It happens that his majesty has also requested a distinguished personal friend of Roosevelt who is now in Germany to write to the president concerning his majesty's unwillingness to receive Hill. Both these communications were sent at the express wish of the emperor. It is just possible that the foreign office is not aware of the second communication, which is probably still in the trans-Atlantic mails.

### MUST ACCEPT STATEMENT AS DENIAL OF REPORT

Washington, March 27.—The statement issued from the foreign office at Berlin in relation to Hill must be accepted by our government on its face as amounting to a denial of the report that Hill was personally objectionable to the German emperor.
