San Francisco, March 26.—After a conference lasting seven hours today between committees representing the Steam Schooner Owners of this port and the local branch of the Marine Engineers' Association, the dispute between the two organizations that has tied up the steam schooners in the lumber carrying traffic for over two months on the coast was settled by concessions on both sides.

The marine engineers agreed to allow the non-association engineers now employed by the three lumber companies to work until their contracts expire, to abandon their former demands, including the manning of vessels and to accept a decrease in pay. The shipowners agreed to abandon their demands for the manning of the vessels, a big decrease in pay and an open shop.
