BARKER'S MILL HAD NARROW ESCAPE FROM BURNING

FIRE CAUGHT BENEATH BUILDING AND WOULD SOON HAVE ENVELOPED ENTIRE MILL HAD IT NOT BEEN DISCOVERED IN TIME—MISUNDERSTANDING OF ALARM

A fire in Barker's sawmill near the Willamette river bridge was discovered just in the nick of time Sunday morning to prevent the total destruction of the plant. Men passing along the road leading to the bridge discovered smoke issuing from the mill and making an investigation of the cause found a blaze of no mean proportions beneath the building. By working hard the men succeeded in cutting out the flames before they did much damage, but two large timber 10x12 inches in dimensions were burned through and some other damage was done. The fire caught in the grease that had dripped down from the planer and it was impossible to extinguish it with water which was carried in buckets, but the men threw wet mud on the flames and succeeded in checking them that way.

An alarm was phoned to the fire department headquarters from the residence of Dr. Henry Hawkins, nearby, about 8:40 o'clock. Fireman Croser was in the rear of the engine house at the time and saw the alarm answered. The person who phoned said: "Come sawmill fire." Croser asked, "Who is phoning?" He received the reply, "Hawkins," and thinking it was J. B. Hawkins, proprietor of the Eugene Lumber Co.'s mill, naturally supposed that it was his mill that was on fire. The chemical engine and hose wagon was taken there, but no fire was seen and Fireman Croser came back down town. When he reached the Hotel Gross he was informed that the fire was in the Barker mill and started the team out that way. The Barker mill being two blocks was told that it was on fire.

This alarm demonstrates the need of an alarm system. One before there was a misunderstanding of the alarm as phoned to the engine house in the rear of the Barker mill residence on West Seventh street.

EX-SECRETARY DUNBAR MUST REPAY FEES

Falem, Or., March 29.—What perhaps the biggest judgment ever rendered against a private individual in the state of Oregon was handed down by Judge Galloway of department two of the circuit court, when he found for the plaintiff in the sum of \$103,925.41 in the Dunbar case. The findings of fact and the conclusions of law and the decision of the court were signed up by the court Saturday.

George G. Bingham, of counsel for Dunbar, is authority for the statement that the case will be appealed to the supreme court as soon as the proper papers can be made out.

DIED.

At Acme, Friday, March 20, 1908, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Saubert, aged four days.

At the Eugene hospital Saturday evening, March 28, 1908, Holma Hagen, aged 24 years, from spinal meningitis. He came to this country from Norway about two years ago and had been working in "Fischer Bros." logging camp most of the time since. His parents live in Norway. The only relative he has here is a brother, Helgar, a few years younger, who came from Norway a year ago at his solicitation.

The funeral was held this morning at 10 o'clock, with interment in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. Dommermaes conducted the services.

JOSHUA HILL.

Joshua Hill was born in Delaware County, Ohio, February 18, 1825, and in 1839 moved with his parents to India where he grew to manhood. At the age of 21 years he married Emeline Klineb, on July 3, 1856. In 1864 he, with his small family, moved to Wisconsin, where he located on a farm. While on the farm he worked hard until his health failed and he decided to come West, coming directly to Fairmount in 1905, where he remained until two years ago, when he moved to Springfield, where he since lived up to the time of his death. He was aged 73 years, 1 month and three days.

The health of the deceased has been poor for the past several years, but he had been confined to his bed but two days at the time of his death. On the 11th day of September, 1906, as he was doing some shopping, he was taken suddenly ill with a very bad stroke of paralysis of the right side which he recovered from. The second stroke happened June 10th, 1907, which was the same side and from which he soon recovered so he was able to be about. Last Thursday, March 19, he was taken with the third stroke, this time being on the right side, which resulted in his death Saturday noon. After the last stroke he did not regain consciousness, but seemed to suffer great pain. He leaves an aged wife and eight children. Four sons and one daughter reside in Springfield and the other three children, two sons and one daughter still remain in the eastern states. He was a good husband, father and neighbor. Owing to his poor health since coming to Springfield, his acquaintance was not very large, though all who knew him have only words of praise, for he was a man who united sound sense with strong convictions. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community. The interment was in the L. O. O. F. cemetery, Monday, March 23, 1908.
