New York, March 30.—Silverstein, the anarchist frantically injured by the explosion of a bomb Saturday, is reported to have made considerable progress toward recovery today. Detectives are active in several directions in an endeavor to search out anarchist groups, and it is reported the police departments of Chicago, Denver, New Orleans and San Francisco have been asked to co-operate with the New York police in their efforts to discover the accomplice of Silverstein.

Police Commissioner Bingham says the police will deal with an iron hand with all future cases of riot and disorder.

## MRS. D. R. LAKIN DEAD; WAS PIONEER, OF 1864

SHE PASSED AWAY SUNDAY AFTER A SHORT ILLNESS FROM LA GRIPPE—FUNERAL TOMORROW

Mrs. Sarah E. Lakin, wife of David R. Lakin, died at her home, 170 East Eighth street, Eugene, Sunday, March 29, 1908, at 12:10 p. m., aged 69 years, 1 month and 6 days. The cause of death was la grippe with complications. She had been confined to her bed only a day or so, although she had not been well for a long time.

Mrs. Lakin was born in Adair county, Mo., and crossed the plains with her first husband, M. T. Branstetter, in 1864, settling in the Long Tom valley in Lane county. Mr. Branstetter died March 28, 1883. About six years afterward his widow married David R. Lakin, who survives her. They were married in Eugene, but lived for a number of years 25 miles west of here, coming to town about ten years ago and residing here since. Besides her husband, Mrs. Lakin leaves the following children: Mrs. Fannie Hanlyan, of Portland; J. Clinton Branstetter, of Eugene; William W. Branstetter, of Eugene; Asa Branstetter, of Vancouver, Wash.; Frank Branstetter, of Portland, and Elma Branstetter, of Portland. She leaves a sister, Mrs. Mildred Donaldson, of Portland, and a brother, Clinton Withrow, of Portland. They will all be at the funeral with probably the exception of the sister.

Mrs. Lakin was a member of the Presbyterian church, and lived a consistent Christian life. The funeral will be held at the residence tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with interment in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Revs. C. A. Wooley and H. N. Munn will conduct the services. Friends of the family are invited to attend.

## GREAT STRIKE OF COAL MINERS ON APRIL 1

Indianapolis, March 30.—A joint conference of the Indiana coal miners and operators, called for today at Terre Haute, adjourned until tomorrow. President-elect Lawmorr, of the United Mine Workers, said today that 42,000 miners in Ohio will drop their tools on April 1 and go on a strike, to remain out for sixty days or longer, and will not go back until the wage scale has been arranged. On the same date 35,000 men in southwestern Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Texas will go out.

## EXPLOSION OF WARSHIP'S BIG GUN

Washington, March 30.—During target practice last Saturday at Magdalena bay one hundred and forty inches of the muzzle of one of the six-inch broadside guns of the Missouri blew off. The fracture was clean and did not indicate any flaw in the metal. Nobody was injured and practice was continued.

## TORPEDO BOAT INJURED IN PRACTICE

Washington, March 30.—The torpedo boat Blekeley, engaged in torpedo practice at St. Johns Bay, Florida, was compelled to return to the Pensacola navy yard where it was necessary to dock the vessel to make repairs. Details of the accident are not given, but it is stated that the vessel was pierced by a torpedo.

## YOUNG MAN AND MARRIED WOMAN ARRESTED

Paul Goodwyn of Medford was arrested last night upon complaint of H. A. Triplett, charged with misconduct with the latter's wife. Mr. and Mrs. Triplett reside at Wendling Goodwyn, who is a youth employed at a localivery stable, claims that he is a victim of a mistake. He was held under bond. Mrs. Triplett was arrested at Gold Hill.—Medford Tribune.

## ADMIRAL EVANS STILL AT MAGDALENA

San Francisco, March 30.—According to the Commercial wireless stations of this city, Rear Admiral Evans, of the flagship Connecticut, which was expected here tomorrow, was still at Magdalena Bay last night. Evans was coming up for medical treatment at the springs.

## EXPRESS MESSENGER ROBBED AND KILLED

Newton, Kas., March 29.—A. D. Bailey, an express messenger of the Wells-Fargo Company, was killed by an unknown person on the Santa Fe train No. 115, between Florence and Newton, early this morning. The murder was very brutal, with robbery the object. Both safes, the local and the through safe, were ransacked and at least \$1000 in money and some jewelry taken. The amount the robbers secured is unknown.

The dead body of Messenger Bailey was found at 4 o'clock this morning when the train reached Newton. It was stretched on the floor of the car, the head beaten to a pulp and there in a pool of blood. The back of the skull was crushed in and the end of the ear where it was being supported with blood. The blood stains are reached to the ceiling.
