HIGH SCHOOL MEETING AT PLEASANT HILL

PROPOSITION TO CONSOLIDATE FIVE DISTRICTS IN THAT VICINITY AND ESTABLISH UNION SCHOOL—OTHER NEWS OF PLEASANT HILL AND SURROUNDINGS

(Special Correspondent.) Pleasant Hill, March 26.—In response to a call for a mass meeting, a large number of people assembled at the school house Saturday to discuss the high school proposition. They were called to order by R. J. Hemphill, one of the chief promoters of the meeting. President Campbell, of the University of Oregon, then addressed the meeting on the need of higher education, from an ethical and economic standpoint, emphasizing the fact that, in the light of recent and increasing scientific discoveries and inventions, at least a high school education was indispensable.

He was followed by Superintendent Alderman, of the Eugene schools, who presented the different plans for establishing rural high schools, and advocating the location of Pleasant Hill as an ideal one from which to start the general movement which should dot the state with high schools and preclude the necessity of sending our children to town or moving there with them. County Superintendent Dillard explained the requirements of the law in this connection, and answered many questions as to the proper method of procedure in the matter. It was the unanimous sentiment of the meeting that a county tax levy be petitioned for, and that the five school districts that originally formed District No. 1 be united for high school purposes only. Petitions are now being circulated for this purpose and will doubtless result in the establishment of the first union high school in Oregon.

Other Notes.

The funeral of Mrs. Margaret Parks on Tuesday last was notwithstanding the very inclement weather, one of the largest ever held in the "hill." Relatives were present from nearly all of the valley, from Collins Grove to Portland. A planer of 1852, and mother of eleven children who lived to be grown, and eight of whom survive her, there were many that found her in this place, where for more than fifty years she was known and loved, and where now she will be sadly missed.

Bristow treasurer to receive contributions for the building of a new wire fence around the grounds. As soon as money enough is raised work will be commenced on this much-needed improvement. Many living at a distance, but who are interested in this matter, will no doubt respond to the call for contributions for this purpose.
