ANNUAL MEETING OF PRESBYTERIANS

REPORTS SHOW INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP DURING YEAR OF 222, WITH TOTAL OF 357 A large number of members of the Central Presbyterian church met last evening in Frank's hall for the annual meeting. Reports were received from all departments of the work, showing the church to be in better financial and spiritual condition than at any previous year. The pastor reported having preached 96 sermons, made 694 pastoral calls, conducted 13 funerals, and officiated at 13 weddings; received into the church 101 new members; 22 had been dismissed by letter, 8 had died, and 2 been dropped. During the pastorate of Rev. Mount the membership has increased from 185 to 357, a net increase of 222. The session was increased from six to nine members, and election was had as follows: For three years, H. Shacklett, E. J. Moore and S. W. Miles; for two years, W. A. Dill; for one year, J. Johnson. Other officers were re-elected as follows: Trustee, J. J. Holt; treasurer, S. B. Eakin; clerk, Ethan Collier. A board of deacons is to be elected.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE IN COOS COUNTY Coquille, Or., March 28.—Rev. E. F. Zimmerman, field secretary of the Anti-Saloon League, is here organizing the temperance forces of the county, and yesterday organized a league here, with the following officers: President, Rev. B. B. Paul; vice president, Rev. R. G. Summerlin; secretary, M. H. Hersey; treasurer, J. J. Lamb. Two committeemen-at-large were selected from each precinct.

TAX COLLECTIONS BETTER THAN EVER

Sheriff Fisk reports that taxes are coming in better than ever before, and when they become delinquent next Tuesday he thinks there will have been collected over \$255,000. The assessment roll calls for over \$325,000 in tax money, and if the amount figured upon is collected by Tuesday, it will be a record-breaking collection. Up to 10 a. m. this morning \$144 receipts had been written.

INCREASE IN CAPITAL OF SAVINGS BANK

In accordance with a resolution passed at a special stockholders' meeting on March 23d, the capital stock of the Eugene Loan & Savings Bank has been increased from \$60,000 to \$100,000, fully paid. The new stock has all been subscribed and issued, and the capital of this bank is now twice the amount required by the state banking law for the largest cities, and is exceeded by but three banks in the state of Oregon outside of Portland. The bank is also strengthened by the addition of five new stockholders, all of whom are citizens of wealth and influence in this county. There is no change in the officers or board of directors, and in this connection, it may be stated that the management of this bank has been the same since its establishment in 1892. Business is very satisfactory, as shown in the statement published today, the deposits having increased over \$70,000 since January 1, 1908, and the available cash now being four times the reserve required by law for demand deposits. It is a source of gratification to Eugene that we now have two banks in the \$100,000 class, and this tends to show the remarkable growth and development of our city, as well as its banking institutions.
