REGISTRATION REACHES NEARLY 5000 MARK

NUMBER OF VOTERS REGISTERED FOR PRIMARIES WILL BE AS GREAT OR GREATER THAN FOR BOTH ELECTIONS TWO YEARS AGO, SAYS REGISTRAR McFARLAND.

By the time the registration books at the county clerk's office close for the primaries the total number of voters registered will be as great or greater than the total registration for both elections of two years ago, says Registrar Charles McFarland, and the total number registered for both elections this year will be several hundred, perhaps several thousand, greater than two years ago. The books close for the primaries at 5 o'clock on the evening of April 7. Up to this morning 4722 had registered. The total number for both elections two years ago was 5142. PUT MANY IDLE MEN AT WORK

Chicago, March 30.—In the next 60 days the railroads of the United States will have to find between 250,000 and 300,000 men to mend their tracks and roadbeds and another large army to go into their shops and repair their cars and their locomotives. The railroads centering in Chicago alone will, between April 1 and June 1, require more than 100,000 laborers, who will be employed in remedying the ravages of the winter months which, with their frosts and their snows, have made many miles of shabby track and as many miles of softened roadbed. The management of all Chicago roads have decided to engage in repair and renewal work this spring and early summer on an extensive scale as ever, owing to the fact that labor will be plentiful and possibly cheaper, and also owing to the fact that there are signs of business renewal everywhere.

SHEDD CITIZENS CAPTURE TWO THIEVING HOBOS

Albany, March 31.—Without the aid of officers, citizens of the village of Shedd, Linn county, last night effected a novel capture of two hobos looting the store of Loris & Shedd, brought them to Albany this morning and delivered them to the sheriff. The hobos entered the store, selected suits and complete outfits, and reaped up. The noise awakened Postmaster M. G. Coon, sleeping next door, who aroused others and guarded the door. The hobos made a break from the door and fled at Coon, but were driven back into the store. The crowd of townsmen grew until the hobos surrendered.
