DIED.

On Friday evening at 7:15, March 29, 1908, at the home of his daughters at Coburg, Oregon, Alva, husband of Alice M. Stearns, aged 64 years, 8 months.

Mr. Stearns was not sick long and his death came as a great shock to his wife, children and many friends.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon at 2:30. The services were conducted by Rev. Erskine of Coburg, and the old soldiers took charge of the remains at the grave. He was laid at rest in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

Deceased was born at Amsterdam, Montgomery county, New York. He was married to Alice Whitlaw about 1866; to them nine children were born, and six still live to mourn his loss. He also has one sister, Mrs. Jennie Snyder, of Coburg, and two brothers to survive him.

Mr. Stearns came west with his parents and settled in Freeborn county, Minnesota, in 1853. He enlisted in the army in 1862, serving his country until the close of the war of the rebellion, being discharged in August, 1865. He served a term as corporal and when discharged was acting as sergeant.

He was a volunteer of the Tenth Minnesota, Company E. Mr. Stearns lost his first wife in 1892 and married again to Mrs. Alice Fatbarn in 1894. They came west to Coburg, Oregon, in 1905, and settled down to spend the rest of their days with us, but his Heavenly Father saw fit to take him home to rest in a land far away from his.

Wherever Mr. Stearns lived he made many friends. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. Lodge at Wells, Minnesota, and was transferred to Benoni, Minnesota. He was a devoted Christian and was a member of the Methodist church.

AMUSEMENTS

The Chicago Symphony Orchestra was organized by Charles Beach in 1899, with Adolph Rosenbeker as conductor. Sixty concerts were given in the United States, followed by a festival tour through Canada. So successfully were these concerts conducted both artistically and financially that a spring tour was made next season extending from Montreal, Canada, to San Antonio, Texas. Since that time eight annual tours have been made by this organization, and the three-day musical festivals of St. Paul, Omaha, Denver, Salt Lake and Galveston have become known for their musical excellence and great financial and artistic results.

In Canada the Chicago Symphony Orchestra has filled many important engagements, and each year fills a series of twelve concerts in a "Cycle of British Music Festivals" extending from Halifax to Vancouver under the direction of Sir Alexander McCallister. Many of the leading musical cities and festival centers have been visited each season until in each city the attendance has become so gratifying that it makes the festival practically self-supporting. The orchestra is now on its fifth tour. The conductor this season is the same talented director and composer as last year, Adolph Rosenbeker. The organization will number 64 artists, instrumentation being beautifully balanced. The organization will have four vocalists to add strength to it among them being the well known oratorio singer, Arthur Middleton. The program repertoire will be exceedingly generous and notable as to the composer represented. The visit to this city, under the auspices of the Ontario Society, will occur on April 14 and 15 at Millard Hall. Stanch tickets now selling at Burdick and Graham's.
