EDNA YARNELL'S BODY FOUND AT 10 LAST NIGHT

WAS LYING AT BOTTOM OF RACE A HUNDRED FEET BELOW WHERE SHE FELL IN—FUNERAL WILL BE HELD SATURDAY AFTERNOON AT RESIDENCE OF MR. AND MRS. Z. A. DAVIS

The body of Miss Edna Yarnell, who was drowned in the mill race yesterday afternoon, as mentioned in last evening's Guard, was recovered at 10:10 o'clock last night, after having been in the water nearly six hours. Immediately after the drowning a search was begun for the body and a large crowd of University students and townspeople kept at the search until they found the body a hundred feet down stream from where the canoe had been overturned. The funeral will be held at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Z. A. Davis, 161 East Eleventh street, where Miss Yarnell boarded, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, and the remains will be interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. J. S. McCallum will have charge of the services.

Story of the Drowning.
 Miss Yarnell and Miss Vesta Davis started out in the middle of the afternoon for a canoe ride up the mill race. They went to the head of the race at Juddkins' Point. In attempting to turn around to come back the swift current caught the canoe and upset it. Miss Davis, being able to swim, reached the shore quite easily. She had hold of Miss Yarnell by the foot for awhile, but was unable to keep her hold and the latter sank to the bottom. Miss Davis called for help, and two University students who were walking along the railroad at the time came to her aid. She told them what had happened and taking her to the Nye residence a quarter of a mile down the race, they gave the alarm and ran back to the scene of the drowning to try and find Miss Yarnell's body. Within a few minutes a large crowd of men and boys were there. Grappling hooks were sent out from Griffin's hardware store and Chief of Police Farrington and many others went out to assist in the search. The bottom of the race was dragged continually and finally, after 10 o'clock, a hook caught on the girl's sleeve and the body was brought to the surface. It was found that her watch had stopped at 4:22 o'clock.

The unfortunate girl was born on her father's farm in the Mohawk valley and was raised there. She was aged 19 years on the 26th day of last September. She was formerly a student at the Eugene business college, and at the time of her death was attending the musical department of the University of Oregon. She leaves besides her father, J. E. Yarnell, several brothers. She was a beautiful girl and had many friends among the young people of the high school, business college and University who are deeply pained on account of her untimely death. She was a member of the Christian church of this city.

J. C. GOODALE WILL BE BURIED AT SALEM

The remains of J. C. Goodale, the former Lane county sawmill man, who died in Southern California yesterday, will be brought to Salem for burial. He died suddenly from heart trouble at Santa Monica, instead of at Sawtelle, as stated yesterday. He was born in New York state December 23, 1832. By his first marriage he has a daughter, Mrs. Rose Wallace, at Channing, Mich. On January 23, 1868, he was married to Ida E. Pilver. To this union were born four children, J. C. Jr., and C. C., of Salem, W. D., of Seattle, and Mrs. Welby Stevens, of Eugene. His wife having died January 29, 1901, he was again married December 30, 1901, to Clara Carkoff, who still survives him. Deceased came to Oregon in 1880 and located at Caburg in the sawmill business in 1885, quitting in 1900 and moving to Salem. He was a prominent Mason and Odd Fellow.
