THREE KILLED MANY INJURED IN TENEMENT

New York, April 2.—Three were killed, fifteen injured and one hundred endangered by a fire in a five-story tenement at 44 Heater street early today. The dead are Berl Weinsteln, wife and infant son, who were suffocated in their apartments on the fifth floor. That more lives were not lost is largely due to the action of three policemen, who rushed into the building and aroused sixteen sleeping families, whose only means of exit were the fire escapes, the stairways being a mass of flames.

When the fire department arrived ladders were run up, but it was with difficulty that the firemen got many of the people from the building. Many people jumped from the windows, breaking their limbs and receiving other injuries.
