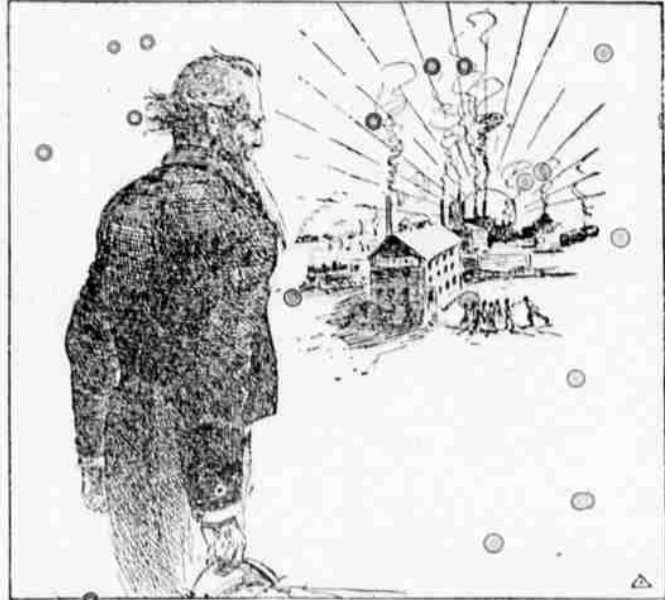
St. Louis, April 3.—Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, was nominated today by the Populist party for president. Samuel H. Williams, of Indiana, was vice president. Following his address the report of the committee on resolutions was presented. ## BATTLE IS ON BETWEEN PARTIES IN CONGRESS

**MINORITY PARTY WILL ATTEMPT TO FORCE ACTION ON MEASURES RECOMMENDED BY PRESIDENT BY HOLDING UP IMPORTANT APPROPRIATION BILLS. REPUBLICANS WILL INVOKE AID OF RULES COMMITTEE TO RETAIN CONTROL.**

Washington, April 3.—The leaders of the two parties in the house agreed that yesterday's engagement on the floor was but a skirmish preliminary to an extended battle, in which the Democratic minority expects to fight out to a finish its program of endeavoring to secure by conviction certain legislation demanded by them, and in part recommended by the president, and the Republican party will abandon its defensive attitude and carry the war across the border.

Five big appropriation bills, the District of Columbia bill, naval academy, naval academy, civil and general deficiency bills are yet to be disposed of, and as the fighting order of the minority is to compel action on selected measures by blocking all action, neither minor bills nor debates of any length will be allowed to consume the time remaining. The understanding is that the Republicans are prepared to bear up against the warfare the minority for a limited time without recourse to the "deadly weapon" of the majority, the rules committee, but that the Democrats will not be allowed to imperil by delay the big appropriation bills. The speaker will not invoke the "dilatory motion" decision unless forced. The house committee on rules today agreed to a program to break the existing filibuster. It provides for the passage of the deficiency appropriation bill now before the house without an intermediate motion, and for the dispensing of the first reading of the District of Columbia appropriation bill, which is to follow the deficiency bill. It limits the general debate on the District bill to two hours.

London, April 3.—News of new German and Prussian loans amounting to \$162,000,000 a surprise in London and has resulted in much discussion and even in the expression of some distrust of the financial position of Germany. ### THIRTY-SIX BRITISH SAILORS WERE DROWNED

Portsmouth, Eng., April 3.—Thirty-six men, including Lieutenant Middleton, commander of the torpedo boat Tiger, lost their lives in a collision off the Isle of Wight last night with the British cruiser Berwick. The vessels were engaged in night maneuvers, and the destroyer attempted to cross the Berwick's bows, being cut to hulk and sinking immediately. Twenty-two of the crew were rescued. The ships were maneuvering without lights.

San Francisco, April 3.—Fire destroyed three buildings at Green and Kearney streets early today and resulted in the incineration of Rosa Oliva, four years old. The property loss was \$12,000.
