FAIR SOCIETY FILES ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

LOTS HAVE ALL BEEN SOLD AND
WORK ON COUNTY FAIR
GROUNDS WILL SOON BEGIN

CAPITAL STOCK OF SOCIETY IS
\$49,800, AND ALL HAS BEEN
SUBSCRIBED BY PURCHASE OF
TOWN LOTS IN HUDDLESTON
ADJOINING GROUNDS

The Lane County Agricultural Society, which has been in course of organization for the past several weeks for the purpose of conducting a county fair, filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk this forenoon. The incorporators are Alton Hampton, Henry Hollenbeck and David Lion. The objects of the society, as set forth in the articles, are as follows: To promote the agricultural, horticultural and industrial development of Lane county and the state of Oregon; to encourage immigration by collecting and distributing reliable information in regard to Oregon and Lane county; to acquire by purchase or otherwise such real estate and personal property as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of the corporation; to buy and sell real and personal property; to hold and conduct fairs for the exhibition of the resources and products of Lane county and the state of Oregon. The principal place of business is in Eugene and the capital stock is \$49,800, divided into shares of the par value of \$300.

The proposed fair grounds, as all know, will be located in the Huddleston addition in the southwestern part of the city. A large number of town lots adjoining the fair grounds were platted and the stockholders in the fair association have bought these lots at \$200 a block in the Huddleston addition. All of the lots have been sold and the carrying out of the society's plans for a fair will proceed. It is expected that the work of building a race track and the necessary buildings will begin just as soon as the weather settles.

ROSEBURG VOTES FOR PAVED STREETS

Total vote—For paving bonds,
102; against bonds, 66.

In fulfillment of expectations, Roseburg's street paving bond election, being held today, is carried by an overwhelming majority. While the vote being cast is comparatively light, it is almost unanimous in favor of the bonds. What little opposition has developed is chiefly of the grip-shove variety, and amounts to practically nothing.

Citizens who have worked so hard for the bond issue are jubilant today and their smiling countenances are to be seen everywhere on the streets. Hundreds of silk badges, bearing the words "I vote for paved streets," are being worn by as many citizens of both sexes, showing unmistakably toward which side of the question the preponderance of public sentiment leans.—Yesterday's Roseburg Review.

ELECTRIC BOAT PRESIDENT ON STAND

Washington, March 31.—The investigation of the charges made by Representative Lilley against the methods used by the Electric Boat Company in securing legislation was resumed by the special committee of the House today. James L. Rice, president of that company, pronounced a "malicious lie" the statement of Mr. Lilley that "the Electric Boat Company has made continued and repeated efforts to influence the action of the Navy Department."

Mr. Rice was the only witness at the afternoon session. Mr. Olmsted read the charges made by Mr. Lilley that the "continued and repeated efforts made by representatives of the Electric Boat Company influence the action of the Navy Department and such efforts in the past were as persistent and notorious as to call forth the condemnation and censure of high officials of the Navy Department."

"The only influence we have had with the navy department," replied Mr. Rice, "is to build the best boat. The rest of the story is a malicious lie."

TRAIN OF 28 CARS HAS SMALL WRECK

Holsey, Or., April 2.—The Southern Pacific northbound freight met with an accident yesterday morning. The trainmen say, to the brakes refusing to work on two empty cars, one of which was smashed to kindling and the other broken in two. There were 28 cars in the train and the demolished cars were about the middle. When the accident occurred they were trying to switch part of the train. Two northbound express and passenger trains and an extra freight were delayed about two hours on account of the trouble.
