SOCIALISTS MEET AND NOMINATE COUNTY TICKET

COUNTY CONVENTION HELD IN EUGENE TODAY AND CANDIDATES ARE NAMED

PLATFORM AND RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED—H. M. MANVILLE CHOSEN CHAIRMAN AND E. C. COLE SECRETARY OF THE CONVENTION—LARGELY ATTENDED

The Socialists of Lane county met in convention in Frank's hall this forenoon at 10 o'clock. After the appointment of committees an adjournment was taken until 1 o'clock this afternoon, when resolutions and a platform were adopted and nominations made for county officers.

Following are the committees appointed at the morning meeting: Order of business—Burgholzer, Powell and Nishwander.

Platform—Merrill, Huston and Egane. Resolutions—Whiteaker, Ford and Westrope.

H. M. Manville, who called the meeting to order, was chosen chairman and E. C. Cole secretary.

Platform Adopted. The committee on platform reported the following, which was unanimously adopted:

"We, your committee, beg to report the following as the platform of the Socialist party of Lane county, Oregon:

"We endorse international socialism and pledge our support to the national and state principles as expounded in the national and state platforms.

"We believe in evolution, and that the present system has outlived its usefulness, and each year works greater and greater hardships and injustice to the masses.

"We believe it is folly to hope for relief under a system that has inflicted the ills of which we complain.

"We believe that the interests of the whole people will become paramount only when we shall establish a system that will eliminate profit, thereby removing the one great incentive to most of the evil-doing that at present covers our country and the world.

"We believe that the program of the Socialist party is the only solution to the problems now confronting the working class, who produce the wealth of the world."

Resolutions. The committee on resolutions reported as follows: the report being adopted:

"We, your committee, on resolutions, would respectfully submit the following:

"We, the Socialists of Lane county, in convention assembled, realizing the injustice of our present insane system of industry, which every few years brings about a condition that throws out of employment hundreds of thousands of workers, entailing untold misery and creating a state of practical anarchy. Why? Because these same workers, having produced so much of the useful and necessary things that they need and suffer for the want of. That the owners of the tools of production can find no market for their sale, therefore, there

being no profit in their production, industry must cease and the workers be discharged. For this their needs be as great as ever and illness means suffering and misery, perhaps starvation. Profit is the first, last and only consideration, and the workers must take their chances until such times as they are 'run in' or starve until conditions so shape themselves that profits are possible. Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we believe in equal opportunities for all, special privileges for none. In other words, a square deal not in protestation simply, but in actual practice.

Resolved, That we believe the creator of wealth is infinitely above the wealth he has created, and should be considered first and independently. We believe the time has come when this unjust and inadequate system should be exchanged for one that will actually give equal opportunities to all and special privileges to none; which will do exact justice; which will provide work for all at all times, and instead of 1-5 give the workers the full product of their toil, thereby enabling all to enjoy all the things of life with leisure to cultivate their minds, morals and manners, and to educate their children.

Resolved, That as the present evils have grown up under the administration of the old parties, we have no reason to hope to relief until new ideas shape our policy; and be it further

Resolved, That the Socialist party offers the only sane program for our relief and emancipation.

CHAMPIONSHIP WRESTLING BOUT DRAWS BIG CROWD

Chicago, April 3.—The greatest crowd that was ever attracted by any similar event in Chicago is expected to gather tonight to witness the wrestling match for the championship of the world between George Hackenschmidt, "the Russian lion," and Frank Gotch, of Iowa, champion of America, in a catch-as-catch-can bout, best two falls in three, and the only hold barred is the deadly strangle.

Gotch is regarded by the betters as having an even chance, and both men are in fine condition. The total purse is about \$15,000, divided \$8,000 to the winner and \$5,000 to the loser.

BANKERS CONDEMN ALDERICH'S PET BILL

Chicago, April 2.—At a meeting of the representatives of the National banks doing business in this city held yesterday, resolutions were unanimously adopted expressing the views of the bankers regarding the Alderich currency bill. They were signed by every member of the Chicago Clearing House Association and given out. The resolutions are in substance as follows:

"That the transfer of nearly \$200,000,000 from the liquid resources of the banks where it is available for loans to an idle fund, on which the banks are forbidden to encroach under any circumstances, will seriously impair the working capital of the country.

Indicates True Method. "That the true method for dealing with a crisis is by providing means for readily increasing the supply of currency when it is needed rather than by locking up continuously and permanently and unnecessarily a proportion of the country's banking capital.

"That the substitution of bonds in the vaults of country banks for balances in the reserve and central reserve cities will not promote safety."
