## CONVENTION OF Y. W. C. A. IN SESSION TODAY

The Y. W. C. A. convention of the associations of Oregon and Idaho opened this morning with about fifty members present, many of whom arriving this afternoon. The delegates that came in yesterday were from Albany College, Ashland Normal, Denton Normal, Philomath College and Chemawa. Pacific University and Willamette University came in this afternoon. The Eugene high school and the University are here.

Upon arriving the delegates are registered at the high school by the girls' association. Miss Adelaide Chase is in charge of the entertainment committee and the delegates report their work as very efficient.

The meeting was called to order at 10 o'clock with a scripture by Miss Frances Gage, executive secretary. At 10:15 President Cannon addressed the delegates under the subject, "Place of the Association in College Life." The president of Mrs. Jessie Homozy, of Portland, was then heard. She brought a letter from the national committee and the national secretary in a letter from Miss Grace Dodge, New York. She particularly took up the work of the conference at the University and the importance of the work. Many calls from towns have been received, some of which are being answered. The delegates are being pointed out in the number camps, where the girls get no advantages whatever.

The budget, which heretofore has been \$1500, was raised this morning to \$1700, a considerable advance when the weakness of the work heretofore so far as considered. Miss Della Watson, the treasurer, told of the needs of the funds.

The State executive secretary, Miss Frances Gage, then made an address. Miss Rose, the secretary for the colleges, then told of her work. There has been a gain in membership everywhere, but college work is in its infancy. The main trouble is that students are not able to do the work before they graduate.

The chief address this afternoon was by Mrs. Jessie Homozy, of Portland, state president, who spoke on the subject of "The Young Woman's Place in the Church." She then spoke on "The Man of Nazareth." Sunday afternoon at 3:30 p. m., William E. Cannon, of New York, will hold a special meeting.

Delegates from the University of Idaho, Weston and Pendleton are not present, they recently had a convention in the inland Empire.

TIME FOR FILING NOMINATING PETITIONS EXPIRED LAST NIGHT, APRIL 2
