## YOUTHFUL FORGER OF CHECKS IN TOILS OF LAW

### ELLIS VAUGHN, AGED 17 YEARS, IN CUSTODY OF JUVENILE COURT—FORGED NAME OF W. A. FOSTER TO \$11 CHECK AND PASSED IT ON CIGAR DEALER

Ellis Vaughn, the 17-year-old son of R. C. Vaughn, who lives near Hendricks' Ferry, on the McKenzie, 15 miles east of Eugene, was arrested this forenoon by Chief of Police Farrington, charged with forgery. Young Vaughn came to town yesterday on this morning and presented to Lee Hosilton, the cigar dealer whose store is in the Coleman building on Willamette street, a check for \$11 on the First National Bank, drawn in favor of himself and purporting to have been signed by W. A. Foster. Hosilton telephoned to the bank to ask if Foster had any money there, and receiving an affirmative reply, he cashed the check. When it was presented to the bank later for payment it was found that the signature was a forgery. A warrant was sworn out for young Vaughn's arrest and he was found on the streets later by Chief of Police Farrington. On his person were several other checks on the same bank and drawn in favor of himself, but had the names of several different persons whom young Vaughn knows, and all were in the same handwriting, that of Vaughn. The young forger was turned over to J. M. Williams, local officer for the juvenile court. His parents were telephoned to and the father will probably arrive down this afternoon. In the meantime the boy is in the custody of the officer.

## ALLEN FRUIT CO. SUES WEBER-BUSSEL CO.

The Allen Fruit Company, of this city, today began suit in the circuit court against the Weber-Bussell Canning Company, the Seattle firm which bought cherries here last summer and which announced some time ago that it would build a cannery in this city this year, to recover \$4265.68, with interest at 6 per cent from July 31, 1907. The Allen company alleges that between June 29, 1907, and July 4, 1907, it delivered and sold at the instance of defendant at Eugene 77,558 pounds of the best quality of Royal Anne cherries for which the defendant agreed to pay the plaintiff 5 1/2 cents per pound, but it is alleged, no part of the sum has ever been paid. Woodcock & Potter are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

## WHOLESALE ROBBERY ON OCEAN LINER

San Francisco, April 4.—F. S. Royster, a millionaire planter of Norfolk, Va., who was touring the Orient on the passenger steamer Mongolia, which arrived here last night, was robbed of \$6000 in Bank of England notes and \$150 in American gold and his railroad tickets to the East.
