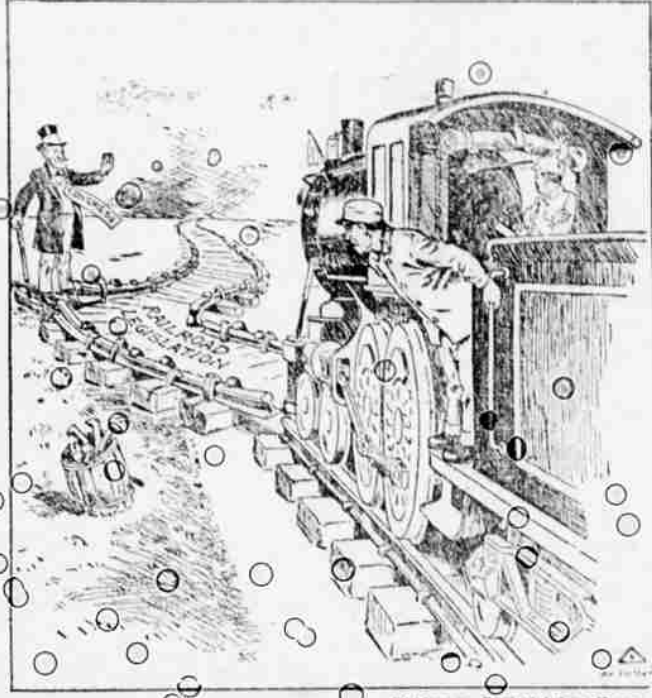
TORPEDO BOATS ARRIVE EARLY AT MAGDALENA BAY

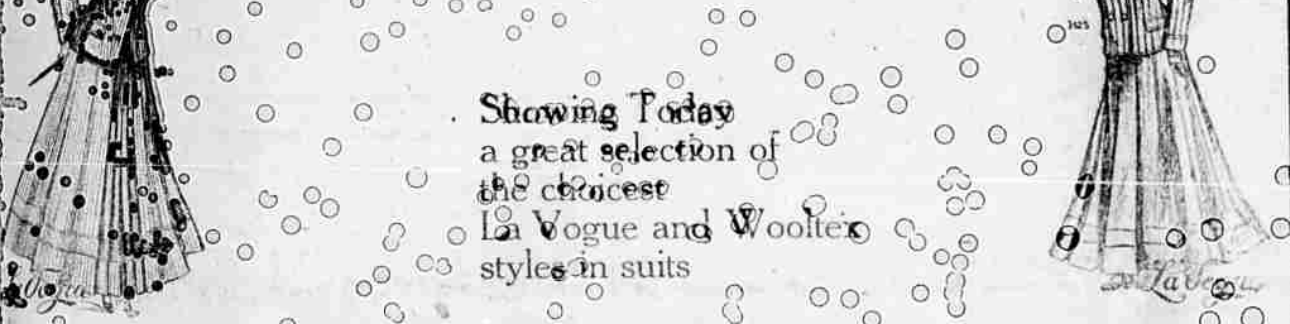

OPERATORS AND MINERS CONFERRING OVER WAGES

Indianapolis, April 6.—Coal operators in the central competitive field, consisting of Western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana, gathered here today for a conference with representatives of the United Mine Workers of America to discuss the initial steps to revive the interstate wage movement by issuing a call for a strike to fix a new wage scale for 100 districts, on which the wage scales in other districts are to be based. There is a possibility of resuming operations pending the settlement of the wage scale, which will also be discussed.

ILLNESS CAUSES BRITISH PREMIER TO RESIGN OFFICE

London, April 6.—Great Britain tonight in a peculiar position, being without a premier or ministry. The long-expected resignation of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the prime minister, was officially announced. According to the court circles he resigned on the urgent recommendation of his medical advisers, and as the constitution provides no automatic successor, it resting with the king to choose the new head of the government, and as in accordance with the custom and precedent, the whole cabinet resigns with the premier, a step to appoint a new minister can be taken until Herbert H. Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer, who has been summoned to Biarritz for the purpose, has seen the king.
