ELECTION ONE OF QUIETEST IN CITY'S HISTORY

The city election today was one of the quietest in the history of the city. In three wards there was only one candidate for councilman in each, the first ward being the only one in which there was a contest, and even there the vote was very light. C. S. Williams and J. E. Roach were the opposing candidates there. In the second ward Captain W. S. Moon was the candidate, in the third ward A. W. Gilbert, present incumbent, and in the fourth ward Colonel J. M. Williams. Following was the vote of each ward at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon: First, 57; Second, 59; Third, 45; Fourth, 56. This is less than half a normal vote.

KILLED GIRL AND ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

Pittsburg, April 6.—Samuel L. Gardner, a prominent resident of Church avenue, in McKees Rocks, a suburb, shot and killed Dorothy Bradley, 16 years old, and fired a bullet into his own head with probably fatal effect. Gardner was aged 59 and lost his position last month. It is believed that brooding over this brought on insanity. It develops that Gardner, who has a wife and several grown children, had been infatuated with the Bradley girl for a long time. It is said that he was enraged last night when Miss Bradley went to church with a young man. Gardner left home this morning, purchased a revolver and went directly to the kitchen of the Bradley home, where Dorothy and her mother were engaged in household duties. Walking straight to the young girl, he pressed the revolver against her breast and fired one shot through her heart. The mother attempted to seize Gardner, but he ran to his own residence, next door, and shot himself.

LIQUOR BILL AGREED UPON BY COMMITTEE

Washington, April 6.—After extended hearings the senate committee on judiciary today agreed upon a bill dealing with the shipment of liquors from one state or territory to another state or territory. The measure substantially provides that there shall be no "collect on delivery" packages of liquor shipped in course of interstate commerce, where fictitious names are used, and that the name of the consignee and consignee shall be stated plainly. This provision is designed to eliminate the practice of railroads and express agencies acting as agents for liquor houses.

PLANS FOR THE NEW POST OFFICE HAVE ARRIVED

POSTMASTER PAGE HAS RECEIVED SIX SETS FOR CONTRACTORS TO FIGURE ON—BUILDING WILL BE 18x80 FEET IN DIMENSIONS, AND BUILT OF PRESSED BRICK WITH STONE TRIMMINGS

Postmaster J. Page has received from Washington, D. C., six sets of plans for the proposed government postoffice building in Eugene, and several contractors will figure on the structure. The bids will be received up to 3 o'clock p. m. on May 9.

A Guard reporter was privileged to examine the plans for the building this morning. It will be handsome in design, 48x84 feet in dimensions and one story high, although the height of the building will be 44 feet. There will be a full basement, where the boiler room, the fuel room and furnace for the heating plant will be located. On the main floor of the building there will be a large work room 30x44 feet in dimensions. This will be located in the rear part of the building. In the southwest corner of the building, facing on West Sixth street, will be the postmaster's room. This will be 16 feet and 9 inches square. The main entrance to the building will be on Willamette street and there will be an entrance in the southeast corner, leading from Sixth street. The steps of both entrances will be of granite with stone trimmings. In the front part of the building will be a large public lobby 12x62 feet in dimensions. The floor of the lobby will be of tile, and there will be a marble baseboard around the entire room with wood wainscoting. The money order and registry rooms will be in the northeast corner of the building. This division will be 16x28 feet in dimensions. In the rear of this will be two vaults, and back of the vaults will be the mailing vestibule, 10x16 feet. This is the northwest corner of the building. There will be closets, toilets and other necessary rooms. Six windows will open into the lobby, as follows: General delivery, two in the money order department—one for paying and the other for receiving—one in the registry department, one carriers' window and a stamp window. The material of which the postoffice is to be built is pressed brick, with stone trimmings. Already one contractor, W. O. Heckart, has spoken for the plans and it is probable that several others will figure on the building.
