LAFOLLETTE OR TAFT IN BADGER STATE

LaCrosse, April 7.—The principal interest in today's election lies in the contest for control of the Wisconsin delegation to the Republican national convention. Early in the year the delegation was conceded to LaFollette, but later the Taft men organized and are making a contest in every precinct. Four delegates are to be elected at large, and 22 from eleven congressional districts, all by direct vote in the primaries.

ADMIRAL EVANS NOT TO PARTICIPATE IN SOCIAL FUNCTIONS

Paso Robles, April 2.—Admiral Evans passed a splendid night, and while the improvement of his condition is all that could be expected, and he has had an attack since his arrival here, it is now practically certain that he will not return to the fleet at San Diego, or participate in any of the celebrations or various functions in Southern California, there being a great opposition on the part of his son, physicians and friends to his determination to rejoin the fleet at San Diego. He may be permitted to take command at Monterey and take the fleet into San Francisco harbor, but it is not expected that he will participate in the social functions, but return to the springs as soon as possible.

EMMA GOLDMAN IS BARRED OUT

St. Paul, April 7.—An express messenger from the Soo line reports that the United States immigration inspectors have detained Emma Goldman, the anarchist at Noyes, on the international boundary line, as she is returning to the United States from Winnipeg. There is no confirmation of the report.

Winnipeg, April 7.—The Canadian government today instructed the police officials here to escort Emma Goldman to the boundary. If the United States government refuses to allow her to cross, she will be sent to Russia, although she claims to be a citizen of the United States.

London, April 6.—H. H. Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer, who has been summoned by King Edward to Biarritz, crossed by the night boat from Dover to Calais tonight on his way to that place to see the king, whose absence at a time when it was foreseen Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's illness must lead almost inevitably to a cabinet crisis, provokes criticism of the British king. There has been a rumor that the king would return to London on Saturday next, but this is very doubtful.

In his letter of resignation to the king Sir Henry advised his majesty to summon Mr. Asquith. The latter, in point of fact, has no rival for the leadership of his party and for the government. His accession to the premiership will undoubtedly lead sooner or later to sweeping changes in the constitution of the ministry, but in the unprecedented circumstances of the British premier resigning during an important session of parliament, it is quite possible that the new premier will content himself with the absolutely necessary changes.

HOWARD GOULD ACCUSES WIFE OF TOO FREQUENT GINGERS IN INTOXICATING LIQUOR—ANSWERS HER SUIT FOR DIVORCE

New York, April 6.—An agreement has been reached by the relatives of Miss Gould to interpose no further objections to her engagement to Prince de Sagan, so it is rumored today a George Gould, custodian of his sister's property, is said to be the only member of the family opposed to the marriage.

HOWARD GOULD ANSWERS WIFE'S SUIT

New York, April 6.—Howard Gould's answer to the suit of his wife Katherine Clemmens-Gould, for a separation and alimony, which was filed in the supreme court, this afternoon, for as the most amazing document that has ever figured in a divorce trial in New York City.

For the first time the name of Dustin Farnum, the actor, is brought forward as a co-respondent. In addition, Mr. Gould declares that his wife was grossly intoxicated at many places on many occasions; that she consumed daily enough mixed drinks to put several strong men out of business; that at theatres, restaurants and hotels she repeatedly behaved in a scandalous manner while under the influence of cocktails, highballs and champagne; that she once broke up a fashionable party by biting her hostess in the arm and that she shocked a wedding party at St. Thomas' church by announcing that she saw "many old cats" present.

In addition to the cause involving Farnum, the answer filed by the millionaire's counsel embodied all the older allegations which he has previously made about his misconduct with Colonel W. F. Cody (Buffalo Bill), both before and after her marriage, drunkenness, quarrelling and using obscene and profane language.

STANDARD GOBBLES LIGHT PLANTS OF CALIFORNIA TOWNS

San Francisco, April 7.—A financial deal of extraordinary importance to San Francisco and California, and which will practically place all gas, electricity, light and power companies in Central and Northern California in one basket, the contents of which will be controlled by the Standard Oil Company interest, was recently consummated. The deal amounts to \$45,000,000, and practically consolidates the gas and electric plants of twenty-five counties.
