CHANCELLOR DAY EXCORIATES RICH WHO BUY TITLES

New York, April 5.—Dr. James R. Day, chancellor of Syracuse University, addressed a meeting of the Harlem branch of the Young Men's Christian Association today. He spoke of a bright industrial future that will follow the present depression. Dr. Day said:

"I hope you young men and old men, too, all have work. If you have not, you will have soon. This nation is too big to be ruined, too big to stop long. The business of the country is not going to stagnate or wither. It is going on."

"Men get rich and then get fat and get dyspepsia and die. The Lord

takes care of that. Most of them are fools, but they die and leave their millions to sons and daughters instead of to Syracuse University.

"And most of the sons are fools, too. They spend the money for automobiles and yachts and great establishments and bye and bye you get it all back.

"The daughters distribute wealth, too. They give some of it to those counts and no accounts. The papers are full of it. Most of it goes abroad, but it all comes back again.

Many of the daughters will sell themselves and give a bonus. We have a market here in this country for rich girls—just as much a market as they have in Constantinople. This market goes all to the ragged and tattered royalty that nobody has any use for abroad.

"It is a spectacle for men and angels and you cannot be personal about such things and you know what I mean; and you can put it down that most of those sales are not turning out very well, and that's a good thing."

JUDGE GRAY OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR PRESIDENCY

Washington, April 5.—Supporters of George Gray, of Delaware, for the Democratic nomination for President have completed arrangements for establishing headquarters in Washington, and tomorrow they will actively enter upon a campaign for the Delaware statesman. R. J. Beamish of Philadelphia, will be in charge of the bureau. He said that the movement is being made without the aid or encouragement of Judge Gray, who, it is added, has not said a word or done anything that could be construed as seeking the nomination.

The fund that is to finance the Washington headquarters has been subscribed, it is said, by a few Delawareans and Pennsylvanians.

The work will be supplemented by that of a similar bureau in Judge Gray's home town—Wilmington. A league of Gray Clubs is also in process of formation. The work of this organization, according to Dr. Beamish, will be done largely in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York and New England States and the South.

HARRIMAN ANSWERS IN MERGER SUIT

Salt Lake, Utah, April 6.—Answers of the defendants in the merger suit of the government against E. H. Harriman et al were filed today with the clerk of the federal court.

In his answer Harriman says that the Union Pacific railroad selected directors for various companies through the ownership of the majority of the stock, but that the companies are operated, managed entirely in their own names, and by their own agents and owners. He admitted the ownership of the steamship lines plying between San Francisco and Portland, but Harriman entered a general denial that competition ever existed between these lines in his network of roads. The answer also denies that his various railroads and steamship lines give him a monopoly of commerce and trade, or power to dictate.

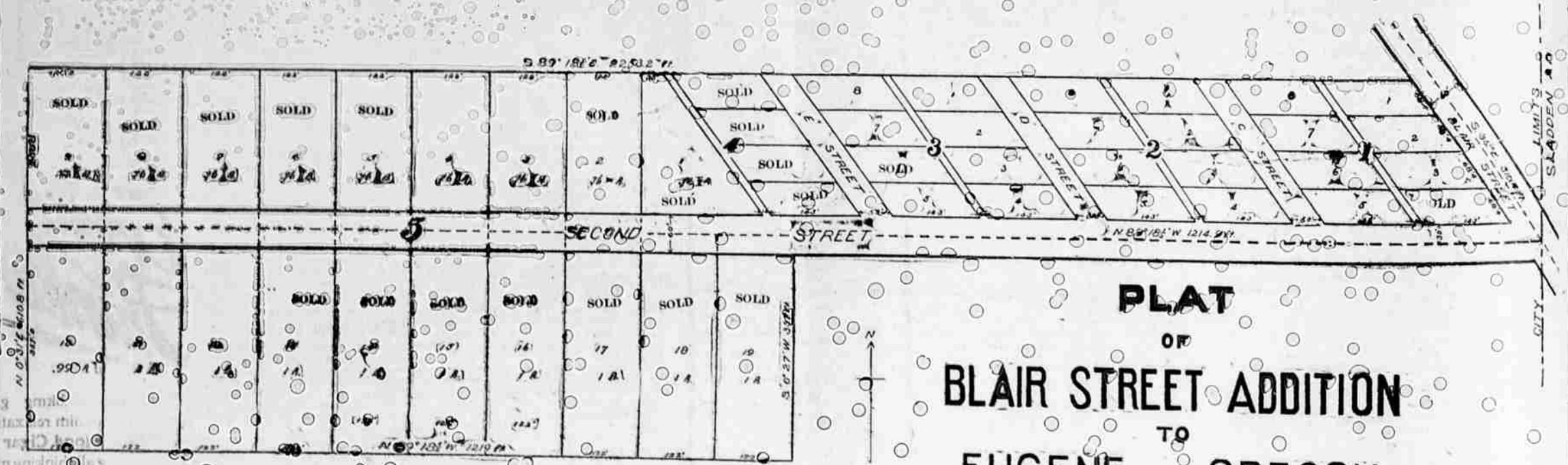
