MEETING HELD TO DISCUSS CANOEING
AN ORGANIZATION AT UNIVERSITY TO BE FORMED WHICH WILL HAVE RULES TO PREVENT FATAL ACCIDENTS

A meeting was held in the Commercial Club rooms last night to discuss canoeing. Mayor Marlock presided, and Professor DeLeon stated the object of the meeting, to discuss the necessity of rules to prevent such fatal accidents as the one of last week, and urged co-operation in making the sport of boating so safe that the present uneasiness of parents might be allayed.

A report of a meeting of students held during the afternoon looking toward the organization of a canoeing club was reported by Dr. Leonard. The organization will be known as the University of Oregon Canoeing Club, and it is hoped that young people outside of the ranks of University students will become members. WALTER WELLMAN FINDS NORTHWEST OPTIMISTIC

Butte, Mont., April 6.—Optimism prevails everywhere in the great Northwest and mountain regions. Traveling from St. Paul and Minneapolis through the Dakotas and Montana, as far as Idaho, and meeting men from all sections of this vast expanse of country, have yet to hear the first word of discouragement as to the business outlook. It is true, the banking and currency panic, which started last fall in New York, and ran almost instantaneously through the length and breadth of the land, did leave a little mark in this region, but it was very small. It did not hurt much.

Do Not Stop Paying Cash.
The banks of this state, be it said to their everlasting credit, did not suspend cash payments, and thus actually abdicate their functions, as banks did almost everywhere else. They met every demand, cashed every check and draft.

Along the Atlantic coast and as far west as Cincinnati and Columbus including very markedly St. Louis, the panic hurt to the quick. Hundreds of thousands of men have been thrown out of employment, and recovery, while visible, is coming very slowly. As far west as Chicago the effects of the panic were less noticeable, and west from Chicago to the Pacific coast the same seems to diminish with increasing distance from New York. But the Pacific coast was hard hit. The P. O. coast was hard hit.

San Francisco Hard Hit.
San Francisco in particular, weakened by the earthquake and conflagration and hampered by labor troubles, and by graft in the city government, is still said to be in a bad way. It is difficult to find the capital with which to finish the hundreds of buildings of castly character through which the city is rising from the ruins.
