400-ACRE RIFLE RANGE FOR U. S. G. AT TROUTDALE

Salem, Or., April 6.—The purchase of a suitable tract of land near Troutdale for use as a state rifle range is the principal matter up for consideration before the State Military Board, which is in session this afternoon. The tract under consideration consists of over 120 acres, and it is also proposed to purchase an adjoining tract making an aggregate of over 400 acres, which will be used in connection with the rifle range as a camp and maneuvering ground for the state and government troops. The war department will be asked to purchase the latter tract.

The outdoor range season opens now in about three weeks. Adjutant General Fluzer will issue the necessary order during the present week. The Southern Oregon troops will begin their competitions immediately, although the Portland marksmen may have to wait a short time for targets to be constructed in case the new range is secured.

Orders will also be issued at an early date for the state competitions. The meet this year will occur earlier than before, possibly a few days after July 4. This is necessitated by the probability of an August encampment.

CORVALLIS & EASTERN MUST BUY NEW CARS

The railroad commission in a decision, which follows in part, requires the Corvallis & Eastern railroad company for their passenger accommodations on the lines from Albany and Corvallis to Yaguina and Toledo.

"It is ordered that the railroad company, defendant, shall in the future supply sufficient passenger cars so that all passengers leaving Corvallis or Albany westbound and Yaguina and Toledo eastbound, may have a seat; and that the second-class coach shall be supplied with ventilators."

The railroad company will have 20 days in which to make the necessary alterations. The case was brought on complaint of B. F. Jones of Independence, formerly of Toledo.—Salem Journal.
