PLANT BEET SEED HERE FOR EXPERIMENT

SAMPLES RECEIVED BY PROMOTION DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCIAL CLUB AND WILL BE PLANTED TO SEE IF LANE COUNTY SOIL IS ADAPTED TO SUGAR BEET CULTURE

The Commercial Club's promotion department has been in correspondence with the Pacific Sugar Construction Company, which a year and a half ago built a plant north of Colusa in Glenn county, California, and in nine months' time founded a splendid city on what formerly was a barley field. The club asked for some of the sugar beet seed, which the company furnishes its patrons, and the California concern sent two pounds of the seed, sufficient to plant one-seventh of an acre, and with the manager wrote for the seed. Ordinarily in order to experiment with it himself, he is anxious to have some of the program, farmers plant some of this seed so that it may be given a fair test. It can be had at the promotion department free of charge.

There has been considerable argument as to whether Eugene and this part of Lane county would be the right place for a sugar factory, and as capitalists do not invest their millions without being absolutely sure that the product they need can be grown to advantage, it is well worth while for our county to give the experiment a thorough test.

Where the factory is now located in California some of the land last year produced as much as 30 tons to the acre, and the percentage of sugar was so high that the price paid by the company came to \$6 per ton.

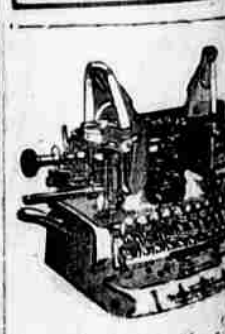
