KANSAS CITY THEATRE CASES WILL BE TRIED

Kansas City, April 10.—There was an unexpected turn in the Sunday observance theatre cases here yesterday, when Judge Wallace, of the criminal court, admitted there was no evidence to convict the 2000 actors indicted in the past six months. After long delay some of the cases were about to come to trial. In the others Judge Wallace refused to grant a change of venue to Judge Porterfield, whom the state supreme court recently declared could try the cases, for the reason that there was no evidence to convict, even if the cases were brought to trial.

Notwithstanding the admission of the court, Judge Wallace declined to grant the change of venue and told the attorneys that the defendants must appear in court or forfeit their bonds.

of home rule which until now may have seen fit to reserve to themselves? I cannot believe it. Upon the contrary, I believe that the limitations upon state and federal governments, the nice balancing of the powers of each, and of the different departments in each, which have been so efficacious in the past, will be maintained in their full vigor in the future.

"Therefore, discharging all of our responsibilities as citizens of a country, refusing to surrender our rights of citizenship in any degree, let us so live that the heroism exemplified on this and other American battlefields may not be simply a tradition, and the national wisdom of our forefathers a mere legend, but that through us and those to come America will reach her full destiny in the permanent establishment of a perfect union, which shall not be for today nor for tomorrow, but forever, and be so established that it will be for all of the people, and that their government shall not perish."

SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the city of Eugene, Saturday, April 12th, 1908, at which the following propositions will be submitted to the legal voters of the city for approval or rejection: 1. An initiative bill filed in the office of the city recorder January 4, 1908, providing for the amendment of sections 108 and 112 of the city charter. The ballot title of this measure states the purpose of the act to be to strike out authority to issue \$100,000 of electric light bonds and \$75,000 of gas light bonds, and to increase the issuable water bonds from \$100,000 to \$300,000, fix the character and manner of issuing such bonds and the distribution of water revenues, authorize condemnation proceedings in building water plant, providing for a water board and fix its duties.

2. An initiative bill filed in the office of the city recorder January 4, 1908, to amend the city charter by adding a new section, 135, providing for the prohibition of burials within the city limits.

3. Proposition to purchase for the sum of \$140,000 the water plant and property of the Willamette Valley Company according to the offer of said company filed in the office of the city recorder March 21st, 1908.

3. THIRD WARD—Sherman Heller, R. S. Bryson and William G. Martin; Bryson and Martin designated as clerks. Polling place, Heller's shop, 41 West Seventh street.

4. FOURTH WARD—D. E. Yoran, G. F. Hurd and S. P. Ness; Hurd and Ness designated as clerks. Polling place, Wilkins building, 88 West Eighth street.

Polls to be opened at 8 o'clock a. m. and closed at 7 p. m. on said 12th day of April, 1908.
